Free, interactive workshops and seminars designed to help job seekers and career explorers discover career paths:



8 bilingual workshops at two locations with 85 workshop attendees.

The Career Fair featured

15 organizations, 250+ attendees, and 23 one-on-one career coaching sessions.

- 2nd Annual Americans with Disabilities Act Birthday Party, celebrated the 33rd anniversary of this important disability civil rights legislation hosted by Hidden Creek Community Center.

- 4,000⁺ people engaged with Phase II of developing the Community-Guided Parks & Recreation System Plan, focusing on under-served communities.
- 1,000+ local students connected with nature-based programming including field trips to Jackson Bottom Wetlands, school-based presentations, and programs at community gardens.

Hillsboro Water Department Wins

Sponsored and participated in the Children's Clean Water Festival for the 29th year in a row.

With EarthCapades, delivered interactive, live environmental theater shows about Hillsboro's drinking water source to thousands of Hillsboro students. Donated life jackets for the 12th year in a row to the "Safe Kids Washington County" coalition to help improve water safety at Hagg Lake.



The City helped Hillsboro businesses expand — generating **3,576 new and retained jobs** and **\$8**+ **billion** in new industrial development investments.

200+ acres added to North Hillsboro Industrial Renewal Area to drive economic investments with the City Council's adoption of the North Hillsboro Industrial Renewal Area Plan Amendment. \$155 million in State of Oregon CHIPS Act funds awarded to three Hillsboro companies:

Intel, Jireh Semiconductor, and Qorvo received 65% of the total \$240 million available.

GRANTS & FINANCIAL AWARDS

\$1.5 million grant to establish the Oregon Semiconductor Center of Innovation Excellence to support commercializing leading-edge manufacturing processes, cooperative research, and product design.

\$300,000 grant to support high-level land use and infrastructure planning for the Hillsboro Technology Park Site.

Hillsboro Technology Park:

\$1 million in infrastructure improvement grants for two water line extension projects, creating **225 new jobs.**

\$1 million grant for the NE Huffman Street extension, creating 100 new jobs.

142 customers received \$63,228 in utility relief assistance during a 2nd round of Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program funding.

Installed

80% of water transmission pipelines (24 miles) in partnership with the Tualatin Valley Water District and the City of Beaverton to build a new, seismically resilient water system.

This will deliver treated, high-quality drinking water from the Willamette River in Wilsonville to our customers by 2026.

424 customers got \$80,530 in emergency bill relief assistance between January and November 2023.

Public Works launched weekly **Bag It & Bring It** self-serve leaf drop off, in addition to our two full-service leaf drop off events with food drives.

SAFETY LIAISON:

Hired by the City for the Shute Park campus to help ensure a safe & welcoming environment through public education, safety advocacy, and positive community engagement.





In-pipe Hydroelectric Project generated 510 kilowatt hours per day, enough to power 18 homes for a year.

Awarded an Oregon Department of Energy grant to survey Hillsboro's water system for additional promising hydropower locations.

- 30,000⁺ native trees and shrubs planted at Jackson Bottom Wetlands
- Curbside battery recycling instituted.
- Two all-electric vehicles received by HPD:
 - Fleet mobile repair vehicle
 - Code Compliance truck
