The Rise of South Hillsboro: 15+ Years of Planning

Oregon's Largest Master-Planned Residential Development Kicks Off



A parade of earthmovers positioned a few hundred feet south of TV Highway – on land that one day will house a Town Center filled with restaurants and retail stores – paused from grading in August in honor of a historic achievement. After more than 15 years of discussions, planning, and presentations at community open houses, finally, the time had come to celebrate the groundbreaking for the South Hillsboro neighborhood.

Mayor Jerry Willey raised his glass of Hillsboro Water to toast South Hillsboro's history and its future with a variety of public- and private-sector partners. The scale of development in South Hillsboro is unprecedented in Oregon: 1,400 acres; 8,000 homes; 20,000 new residents. All spread out over 20 years.

The public-private partnership is creating a neighborhood

that represents the best of Hillsboro and lives up to its promise of being an inclusive, connected, and green gathering place.

Within South Hillsboro's master plan, residents and visitors will find 286 acres of new parks and open space, 15 miles of trails, and a multi-modal transportation network featuring world-class bicycle infrastructure and sidewalks.

The neighborhood's strategic design places schools near parks, and makes it easier for families to get around without driving a car.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Summer Road Improvements Nearing the Finish Line

Each of us feels it when our commute takes longer than expected, but we also understand that we need to take care of our roads so that they take care of us. We need added traffic capacity on our major roads so that our families and our employees have an easier drive. That's why this summer's road construction is so important to our transportation network.

Think about a teacher heading home on Cornelius Pass Road during the afternoon, or parents taking



Cornell Road to pick up their child from daycare. A few extra minutes on the road in traffic each day adds up. Adding a third lane in each direction on Cornelius Pass, turn lanes onto Cornell, or new buffered bicycle lanes on Baseline Road can help everyone get where they need to go sooner.



South Hillsboro neighborhood developers Newland Communities; Hagg Lane, LLC; and Pahlisch Homes are prepared to create a balanced range of single-family and multi-family housing options for everyone, with home construction beginning as early as late 2017 or early 2018.

Years of planning and negotiations led to the adoption of a development-funded Finance Plan that calls for \$450 million in infrastructure investment; including, \$300 million in new roads, trails, bike lanes, sidewalks, pedestrian crossings and signage. These investments will increase options for drivers and improve existing intersections.

The City of Hillsboro required developers to build the necessary transportation, park, trail, and utility infrastructure themselves, ensuring that existing Hillsboro residents are not asked to pick up the tab for the infrastructure that exclusively serves new homes. Private-sector partners are taking the lead on extending Cornelius Pass Road south of TV Highway, and Blanton Street west from 209th Avenue.



Washington County's Board of Commissioners, in partnership with the Hillsboro City Council, accelerated development of major roads and intersections, including improvements to TV Highway at 209th Avenue and at Century Boulevard. Accelerating these projects and delivering new signalized intersections up to five years early will benefit all drivers, bus



riders, pedestrians, and cyclists – not just those who will live in South Hillsboro. In addition, TriMet is planning to increase public transit services.

Ultimately, South Hillsboro will allow employees who currently drive in and out of Hillsboro to live closer to work and spend more time with family. As a place where community comes to life, South Hillsboro will be an asset for those who choose to live there, and for all Hillsboro residents who can enjoy the neighborhood's many public spaces and amenities.

How long we wait to invest in road improvements depends mostly on how we pay for them. This year, needed capacity-improvements on Baseline Road, NE 28th Avenue, Brookwood Parkway, and Cornelius Pass Road have all moved forward at the same time. The reason? Millions of dollars in support from our partners at Washington County, the State of Oregon, and new business development and expansion. While we prefer to stagger projects, the financial opportunity was too great to pass up.

The good news is the finish line is nearing on several projects. Our partners at Washington County have essentially completed improvements to Baseline Road between Brookwood Parkway and 231st Avenue. Hillsboro Public Works Department employees are all but done with enhancing and widening NE 28th Avenue, between Cornell Road and Main Street. Washington County also plans to wrap up road-capacity improvements on Cornelius Pass and Brookwood Parkway by the end of the year – including cycle tracks and buffered bike lanes that protect riders.



We will continue to invest in new projects, in South Hillsboro and beyond, that improve safety and traffic flow. That includes the widening of Cornelius Pass Road from Lois Street to TV Highway, and key-intersection improvements such as Cornell Road at 25th Avenue. On behalf of our City and our partnering agencies, thank you for your patience and understanding this year as we work to make our roads better for our entire community.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Case Study: The 4th Main Public-Private Partnership

Tracking the results of Hillsboro's public-private partnerships helps us assess their effectiveness and reflects our City's commitment to excellent customer service and transparency.

We recently completed a case study of the public-private partnership that led to Downtown Hillsboro's 4th Main mixed-use building, named after its location at the corner of 4th Avenue and Main Street. Among the case study's highlights:



2014: The grand opening of the 4th Main mixed-use building.

The four-story, mixed-used building opened in May 2014, adding 71 market-rate apartments that were fully leased within six months.

The 4th Main project addressed a goal of the Hillsboro 2020 Vision and Action Plan to provide new housing options that add residents to Downtown Hillsboro and help to establish an 18-hour environment.



2007: The corner of 4th Avenue and Main Street was used as a surface parking lot.

- The \$18 million project cleaned up a brownfield site and returned the property to a productive use after 14 years as a vacant building and parking lot.
- The project created a permanent home for the Bag & Baggage professional theatre company.

CITY NEWS BRIEFS

 More than a dozen youth living in Hillsboro shelters took part in the first-ever Camp Eagle, a two-day summer camp experience at lackson Bottom Wetlands Preserve.



- Following a national recruitment campaign and a highly competitive application and interview process that featured 91 applicants from as far away as Boston, Florida, and Bermuda, the City of Hillsboro has selected Robby Hammond to become Hillsboro's Assistant City Manager of Community Services. Hammond has served as Hillsboro's Human Resources Director since 2012.
- The Hillsboro City Council voted to establish
 a citywide marijuana sales tax set at the
 maximum percentage allowed by State law,
 which is currently three percent. The sales
 tax measure will be presented to voters in the
 November General Election.

Sidewalks Near Schools Remain Top Priority

The start of the new school year serves as a reminder of the importance of sidewalk connections.

Making our neighborhoods, parks, and schools more accessible by closing sidewalk gaps is a priority in the City of Hillsboro.

Over the last year, the City has completed these sidewalk projects:

- NE Grant Street, near Poynter Middle School (pictured right) (Total cost: \$544,000)
- SE 24th Avenue, near WL Henry Elementary School (Total cost: \$366,000)

City staff are working to complete these projects that include sidewalks:

- NE 28th Avenue, between Main Street and 25th Avenue, near the Washington County Fairgrounds (Total cost: \$7.7 million)
- SE Alder Street, between 11th and 21st avenues, near W.L. Henry Elementary School (Total cost: \$1.1 million)

In addition, the City is preparing these upcoming transportation infrastructure projects that include sidewalks:

- SE Cedar Street, near Brookwood Elementary School (Total cost: \$4.6 million)
- SE Golden Road, between Brookwood Parkway and Imlay Avenue (Total cost: \$3.4 million)
- NE Jackson School Road, between Grant and Rogahn streets, near Jackson Elementary, Lincoln Elementary, and Mooberry Elementary schools (Total cost: \$9.4 million)



Hillsboro's newest public art piece is making its mark on the Shute Park Library, along SE 10th Avenue. Shute Seeds, a stainless steel sculpture with color-changing LED lighting, has transformed the Library's south wall into a canvas for colored shadows, with images conveying the thoughts and dreams of Hillsboro residents.

At an August dedication ceremony, sculptor Blessing Hancock praised the community engagement that incorporated ideas from neighbors, library patrons, and students into the artwork. South Meadows student Erich Flint highlighted Hillsboro's natural beauty with a view of Mt.


Hood in the distance, surrounded by trees and plants.

Joselene Roman's (pictured right) rose design was inspired by her appreciation for her mother's hard work so she would have more opportunities.

"She means the world to me and she loves roses," Roman said. "I wanted to look into the inside of the flower."

South Meadows Middle School Assistant Principal Jose Barraza spoke in both English and Spanish

about how the artwork was grounded in the community. Barraza praised the



inclusion of student artists, expressing the hope that young people will return to the artwork over the decades and know they contributed to the City of Hillsboro.

 The Main Library is now Brookwood Library, and the Shute Park Branch Library is now Shute Park Library.
- Both locations will have **new library hours** beginning on September 15: Monday Thursday: 10 am 8 pm; Friday Sunday: 10 am 6 pm.
- June 2016 was one of the busiest months in the Hillsboro Public Library's history with **87,507 visits** a pace that would add up to more than one million visits over the course of a year.

Volunteers Build McKinney Park Playground in Six Hours

With sunscreen in demand, 238 volunteers from the Hillsboro community and CarMax joined together on August 11 with one mission: to build a new playground at McKinney Park in a single day. Nearly six hours later, the playground was complete, featuring climbing areas, a slide, and tire swings.

Helped by the Hillsboro Community Foundation and KaBOOM!, Hillsboro Parks & Recreation Department employees secured a generous in-kind grant from the CarMax Foundation valued between \$80,000 to \$90,000. The grant funds paid for the new playground equipment at McKinney Park, located at 375 NW Dennis Avenue.

PARKS & RECREATION NEWS

- Crews installed a 174-foot-long, 90-ton cement & steel bridge at Orenco Woods Nature Park in August. The bridge is part of the Rock Creek Trail extension and is one of three bridges at the park. Park construction is scheduled to finish this winter.
- **SHARC** will close for annual maintenance and improvements between Tuesday, September 6 and Sunday, September 18, and will reopen on Monday, September 19.
- The first "Dive-in Movie" at SHARC, featuring the movie Zootopia, attracted about 300 people in July, including more than 140 swimmers.
- The 12th annual **Celebrate Hillsboro**, presented by *Tuality Healthcare*, brought the largest crowd in the event's history more than 11,000 people to Downtown Hillsboro.







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Q & A with HPD School Resource Officer Stephen Slade

As students return for a new school year, Hillsboro Police Department School Resource Officer Stephen Slade shares his experiences working in the hallways and classrooms of Hillsboro schools.

Can you describe a typical day?

I spend most of my day addressing issues at one of the three schools where I patrol. Each of our six School Resource Officers work at three schools, and each school has its own identity.

Tell us about the work you do inside the schools? I attend school-related meetings and occasionally present police-related topics to classrooms. I'm often called to help with issues related to attendance and truancy, crime reports, and even child abuse cases. The value of having a Hillsboro Police presence in our schools cannot be





I've seen students struggling early in the school year overcome and excel by the end of the year. I've witnessed amazing teachers, principals and vice principals, counselors, and support staff who work incredibly hard to help our youth. There's a lot of hard work and stress, but it's all worth it if you can reach one student who may be heading down the wrong path.

Smoke Alarm Advice: Test Monthly, Replace Every 10 Years



Do you know how old your smoke alarms are? As part of Fire Prevention Week, which runs October 9 - 15, the Hillsboro Fire Department is

reminding residents to replace your smoke alarm within 10 years from the date of manufacture on the alarm – not the date that you purchased it.

Look on the back of your smoke alarm to find the date of manufacture and determine your alarm's expiration date. Smoke alarms should be tested monthly, and the batteries should be replaced once per year or when they begin to chirp, signaling that they're running low.

• The Hillsboro Fire Department honored Nathaniel Davis with a Citizen Life Saving Award for helping to revive a fivemonth-old girl. Davis had just finished an appointment at the Brookwood Library, where he provides job coaching to employees, when he saw three women panicking in the Library's parking lot. After hearing the infant's mother yell, "My baby is dying!", Davis applied cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) to the infant, who was later revived with the help of first responders. Hillsboro is America's Top-Ranked Green Power Community

Hillsboro's reputation as a national leader in environmental sustainability continues to grow after the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recently announced Hillsboro is America's top voluntary purchaser of community-wide green power.

In 2015, the Hillsboro community voluntarily purchased nearly 1.5 billion kilowatt-hours (kWh) of green power, representing 62 percent of all power purchased in Hillsboro. By choosing to purchase zero-emissions green power – such as wind, solar, and



geothermal energy – Hillsboro residents and businesses are helping to advance the green power market, to support clean, renewable energy alternatives, and to improve the environment.

In June, the City of Hillsboro received a U.S. Conference of Mayors' 2016 Climate Protection Award in recognition of the community's Environmental Sustainability Plan, which includes a community goal for 75 percent purchase of green power by 2035.
