Winter Village Returns to Orenco Station Plaza

Ice Skating Rink Expands by 16 Feet, Season Now Two Weeks Longer



Ice skaters of all ages will have more room to skate at Winter Village at Orenco Station Plaza.

More than 5,000 ice skaters and spectators enjoyed Winter Village at Orenco Station Plaza during its 2015 debut, proving to City of Hillsboro organizers that more is needed: Skaters need more space; Families need more days to get on the ice. Now, returning for its second season, Winter Village is growing.

The region's only open-air ice skating rink will re-open Friday, December 2, with an additional 16 feet of ice for skaters to lace up and enjoy the ice more comfortably and safely. The expanded rink will be nearly 100 feet long.

Meanwhile, the
Hillsboro Parks
& Recreation
Department has
added two weeks to
the skating calendar
for a full 30 days
of Winter Village
skating through

Monday, January 2. In addition, a newly-created Winter Village scene near Orenco Station Plaza's oak trees will feature metal-framed carolers and gingerbread characters, lit up similar to ZooLights at the Oregon Zoo. continued on page 2

"People want more fun things to do in the winter to spend time with friends and family, and create new traditions," said Winter Village organizer Iris Ringer. "Winter Village at Orenco Station Plaza is helping our community make lasting memories and create some real holiday magic."

Ringer says children and families were well represented during daytime skate sessions last year, while teens and couples skated at night more often. About half of Winter Village attendees in 2015 were 35 - 45 years old.

"Many people have moved here from outside of Oregon and are excited to have a fun winter experience in the

city," Ringer said. "Having shopping and dining options around Orenco Station Plaza makes Winter Village an even better place to grab a bite to eat, lace up the skates, and enjoy a hot beverage."

Since last year's Winter Village, La Provence restaurant has opened, as well as the recentlycompleted Vector apartment building, and parking options in the neighborhood have increased. With visitors able to ride MAX Light Rail to Orenco Station, Ringer expects between 7,000 and 10,000 people will enjoy Winter Village in 2016.



Hillsboro Focuses on School Route Safety

The City of Hillsboro is developing action plans for student safety enhancements around eight neighborhood schools:
Brookwood Elementary, Eastwood
Elementary, Lincoln Elementary, McKinney
Elementary, Mooberry Elementary, Rosedale
Elementary, Witch Hazel Elementary,
and W.L. Henry Elementary. The Oregon
Department of Transportation's Safe Routes
to School program is providing grant funding
to increase childrens' safety for walking and
bicycling to schools.



Additionally, Hillsboro Public Works

Department employees examined safety concerns at the intersection of SE Johnson Street and SE 75th Avenue next to Ladd Acres Elementary School (following the auto-pedestrian accident in September that injured a mother and her two children). The driver cited sun glare or sun blindness as a factor in the crash that occurred in the crosswalk. City staff also observed vehicles parked too close to the intersection. Staff then installed signs designating four "No Parking" zones to ensure drivers do not park within 20 feet of the intersection, in accordance with Oregon state law.

Lawmakers Tour Hillsboro's Roads

State lawmakers working to develop a transportation funding package during the 2017 Legislative Session toured Hillsboro in September to learn about



local transportation investment needs and opportunities. The 14-member Joint Transportation Preservation and Modernization Committee visited South Hillsboro and Brookwood Parkway, and learned how transportation infrastructure would support job creation.

City Crews Clear Trees During Storm Response


Hillsboro Public Works Department crews responded fast and frequently to severe weather that rolled through the City in mid-October. Employees cut and cleared more than two dozen fallen trees from the roads, and made sure that traffic signals, street signs, and street lights stayed upright and working.



Street Tree Leaf Pick-up Program Returns

The City of Hillsboro's annual curbside street tree leaf pick-up program helps keep streets clean and reduces flooding caused by clogged storm drains. To help us better serve you, please rake loose street tree leaves into a windrow, 18 inches away from the curb to allow storm water to drain. Keep leaf windrows less than three feet high and do not block mailboxes, driveways, garbage collection, intersections, or cul-de-sacs.

If you miss your neighborhood's leaf pick-up date, you can bring your leaves to the City's leaf disposal location – the Fairground Sports Complex on NE 28th Avenue, by the tennis courts – on November 5, December 3, or December 17, from 9:30 am - 3:30 pm. Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons in Hillsboro

A total of 16 Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB) have been installed throughout the City of Hillsboro to alert drivers to stop for a crossing pedestrian, including several near schools in Hillsboro:

Two additional RRFB installations are currently planned to serve students at Hillsboro schools. RRFBs will improve pedestrian safety at both Witch Hazel Elementary School and South Meadows Middle School, and near W.L. Henry Elementary School. The City continues to identify additional school locations and funding sources for future RRFB installations.



Air Quality Advisory Season Begins November 1

The City of Hillsboro is working to improve air quality in our community by reducing air emissions of fine particulates called PM 2.5, which can pose serious health concerns.

Outdoor Burning Prohibited Year-Round

Yard debris burning is prohibited on residential properties at all times, year-round. The ban does not apply to recreational fires, such as backyard fire pits, chimineas, or barbecues.

Indoor Burning Air Quality Advisories

Between November 1 and March 1, the City of Hillsboro and Washington County issue a daily air quality advisory (right).

*Exempted from this indoor burning policy are:

- Pellet Stoves
- Households experiencing an interruption in utility service (electricity and natural gas)
- Households that qualify as low-income



RED: Air quality is unhealthy. No fireplace or wood stove use, unless exempted.*

YELLOW: Air quality is unhealthy for sensitive groups. Voluntary limitations on fireplace and wood stove use.

GREEN: Air quality is healthy. No restrictions.

- Households with extended interruptions to their primary heating system (no more than 60 days)
- Households that rely on wood burning as their only source of heat

The Value of Hillsboro's Water System

Hillsboro families count on the Hillsboro Water Department to provide reliable, high-quality water each day. To ensure our water supply meets the service needs of current and future customers, the City of Hillsboro is developing an additional water source and investing to maintain the aging current system, and to upgrade infrastructure to withstand earthquakes.



Source water protection and sampling programs are vital to ensuring that level of confidence. At the same time, the City of Hillsboro Utilities Commission focuses on balancing reliability, quality, and resiliency, with water affordability and overall value.

For more than 75 years, the City of Hillsboro has provided safe, reliable water to customers at rates that are among the lowest in the region. On October 1, water rates across all customer classes increased by nine percent. For the average residential customer, that increase translates into \$2.43 per month, or \$4.86 per bi-monthly bill. Even with an increase, Hillsboro's water rates remain competitive for the Portland-metro area.

Q&A with HPD School Resource Officer Adela Rios

Hillsboro Police Department School Resource Officer Adela Rios shares her experiences serving English- and Spanish-speaking students at Glencoe High School, Lincoln Street Elementary School, Patterson Elementary School, Jackson Elementary School, and the Transition Program at Miller Education Center.

How do students react when they see you?

Usually, they are smiling because that's how I approach them. I try to build relationships by relating to them and listening – and not just in the classroom, also out in the community. As adults, we forget how hard it is to grow up today. Our world is moving so fast and it's so important to stop and listen, rather than critiquing or judging.

What messages do you share with students?

We emphasize three principles: Be safe. Be responsible. Be respectful. All of our work goes back to that. We talk with sixth-graders about social media and explain that when you "like" a hurtful message, you are approving and sharing that message. It's as if you are saying it yourself. Recently, we've been talking with second-graders about scary clowns and asked, are you being respectful when you try to scare someone on purpose or make them cry? It's not a joke to the person who feels scared and harassed.

How does speaking Spanish help you connect with students?

Being bilingual is very important in the schools I serve and throughout our community. Just saying hello, listening, or answering questions about the schools or about the community have helped me develop strong connections with our Latino families. When parents see me talking with their children, they approach and join the conversation. When kids see me talking with their parents, they do the same – and that's how we succeed in our mission of serving our community.

City Makes Purchase Offer on Hank's Property in Downtown

Making Downtown Hillsboro a more vibrant, livable place has been a top community priority for years. Now, an entire block could be the catalyst for further developing Downtown, as well as connecting Hillsboro's Health and Education District with the historic Downtown.

The City of Hillsboro has offered to purchase the former Hank's Thriftway property in Downtown Hillsboro between SE Washington



and SE Baseline streets, and SE 6th and 7th avenues. Terms of the \$4.8 million purchase offer afford City staff 60 days to conduct environmental and property inspections, and receive final approval from the Hillsboro City Council. The Council will hold

a Work Session on Tuesday, November 1, and a Council vote on the purchase agreement is expected on Tuesday, December 6.

The Hank's property presents a unique opportunity to ensure development is in line with the goals of the Downtown Framework Plan and the Downtown Urban Renewal Plan. Both plans identify mixed-use development projects that support regional transportation investments as a high priority for the Downtown area.

Reasons to Purchase the Hank's Property:

- The site is a full city block and represents the best opportunity for the City to continue aiding in the revitalization of Downtown Hillsboro.
- The Hank's property is unique in its ability to connect the Health and Education District with the historic Downtown.
- The Hillsboro City Council has identified development of the site as a top priority.
- Health and Education District partners
 Tuality Healthcare and Pacific University,
 as well as the Hillsboro School District,
 are engaged in the planning.
- Potential development strategies include housing, education, health care, and commercial activity.








Hillsboro Wins National Award for Public Participation

The City of Hillsboro's commitment to public participation has earned national honors. The International Association for Public Participation USA (IAP2) selected Hillsboro as its 2016 Organization of the Year for demonstrating proactive community engagement and public involvement "core values" in creating the Hillsboro 2035 Community Plan.



"The Hillsboro 2035 Community Plan is the result of tremendous community leadership, strong partner commitments and a fullysupportive City Council," said Mayor Jerry Willey.

The 2035 Community Plan, adopted in 2015, is the City's renewed 20-year vision and action plan, created with input from more than 5,000 community members.

Hillsboro won the IAP2 Project of the Year Award in 2002 for the Hillsboro 2020 Plan adopted in 2000.



City of Hillsboro Becomes First to Win Gold Safety Award Two Years in a Row

The City of Hillsboro's commitment to employees' safety is making history. For the second straight year, Hillsboro topped some of the state's largest cities to win the Gold Safety Award at the League of Oregon Cities (LOC) annual conference in September. In the process, Hillsboro became the first city in Oregon to win the award in back-to-back years. The annual award recognizes cities with the fewest number of work days lost due to on-the-job injuries.



Mayor Willey Wins James C. Richards Award for Exceptional Service



Hillsboro Mayor Jerry Willey has been honored by the League of Oregon Cities with the James C. Richards Memorial Award for exceptional service by an elected city government official. Elected leaders from throughout Washington County highlighted Mayor Willey's efforts to collaborate on behalf of residents in Hillsboro and throughout the region.

Hillsboro Receives Federal Grant Funding for Body-Worn Cameras

Hillsboro Police Department (HPD) employees will utilize a \$217,500 federal grant to research and establish a body-worn camera program that enhances police officer interactions with the community, continues to build trust, and demonstrates the department's commitment to transparency.

Hillsboro is one of four Oregon law enforcement agencies to receive federal funding from the Department of Justice's Office of Justice Programs. The body-worn cameras will document the community-minded policing work that officers do each day, and increase the effectiveness and efficiency of the judicial process through video and audio documentation.



Community involvement will be crucial in developing a body-worn camera policy that builds on the existing positive relationship between police and residents. Tools to encourage community participation include developing community surveys, holding public forums, and utilizing social media to inform residents and businesses.
