
Hillsboro is home to a diversity of flavors. You may already know about our outstanding Indian restaurants or the wide variety of excellent Asian cuisine, but there are many other Hillsboro chefs sharing their passion for food each day.


The City of Hillsboro is helping community members to pursue their dreams. This spring, the

City launched "Cocinemos", which translates to "cooking together" or "let's cook".

Cocinemos is a food entrepreneurship program that helps local Latino entrepreneurs overcome linguistic, financial, and cultural barriers to successfully start and grow food-based businesses in Hillsboro.







- **Eugenio Flores** of Paleteria Flores is selling his frituras (chips) in 4 local stores, including Yesenia Bakery in Hillsboro.
- Rosalva Martinez sells her artisanal Rainbow Ice Cream at M&M Market, as well as at the Tuesday Night Market.
- Cristian Barajas of Sweet Teriyaki makes and sells teriyaki chicken, shrimp, and beef, as well as noodles and rice, at M&M Market. Cristian is exploring ways to sell his homemade teriyaki sauce.

One of the biggest challenges to starting and growing a food-based business is gaining access to a commercial or commisary kitchen. Starting this summer, this group will have access to the newly renovated Hillsboro Community Senior

Center kitchen to develop their recipes and prepare foods for sale.

We hope you will join us in supporting these home-grown local entrepreneurs, and in supporting our established restaurants and foodbased businesses.

Block 67 Update at Open House #2

Downtown Hillsboro's Block 67 redevelopment project will hold its second community open house on Tuesday, July 11, at the Walters Cultural Arts Center.

Open house attendees will be first to hear about recent market studies for residential and grocer uses.

About 150 people attended the first Block 67 open house in March to discuss possible uses for the site between SE Washington and SE Baseline streets, and SE 6th and 7th avenues.

In April and May, more than 400 people participated in an online survey to share their thoughts on potential uses for the Block 67 site, including:

- 1. Grocery store/food service
- 2. Retail (shops, services, coffee shops)
- 3. Restaurants
- 4. Recreational activity (theatre, athletic facility)

WATER NEWS

- The City of Hillsboro Water Department's 2017 Water Quality Report details the outstanding quality and value of Hillsboro's drinking water, and is available online at Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/WaterQualityReport.
- The City of Hillsboro Utilities Commission will hold a public hearing on Monday, July 10, at 6:30 pm at the Hillsboro Civic Center to discuss a proposed 11 percent water rate increase for all retail customers: residential, industrial, and commercial. If approved, the change would take effect on October 1. The average customer using nearly 6,000 gallons of water each month would see the bill increase \$3.25, from \$29.50 to \$32.75. The Willamette Water Supply Program is bringing a second water source to Hillsboro. As part of the project, construction on an underground drinking water pipeline under Cornelius Pass Road in Reedville and South Hillsboro. This construction is scheduled to be completed in late summer 2017. Learn more at OurReliableWater.org.



Progress Report: Street and Sidewalk Improvement Updates

- NE Century Boulevard (formerly NW 231st Avenue) will be widened this summer at NE Cornell Road, and NE Cherry Drive will be extended to NE Ray Circle. Learn more about both improvement projects, which are expected to continue through fall 2018, during an open house on Wednesday, July 19, from 5 - 7 pm at Quatama Elementary School.
- The Cedar Street Improvement Project will add bike lanes and sidewalks to improve safety between Brookwood and 32nd avenues. Get project updates and ask questions during an open house on Wednesday, July 12, from 5 - 7 pm at Brookwood Elementary School. Find more information online at Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/Cedar.
- 12 additional Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)
 parking stalls have been added in **Downtown** Hillsboro, helping the City meet federal requirements for accessibility.
- 9 loading zones have been repositioned or added in Downtown to allow easier access for delivery vehicles. These changes do not impact available parking in Downtown.

Fiscal Year 2017-18 Budget Highlights

The Hillsboro City Council unanimously adopted the City's Fiscal Year 2017-18 Budget to provide the high-quality services needed by Hillsboro residents and businesses.

Reflecting the goals of the Hillsboro 2035 Community Plan, as well as the goals of the City Council, the \$536.3 million budget maintains the City's long-term financial health. The budget also maintains public assets, such as buildings, equipment, and infrastructure.

This year's budget includes funding to:

- Continue work on the Willamette Water Supply Program
- Expand the Joint Water Commission Water Treatment Plant
- Expand the Hillsboro Police Department headquarters
- Design the Hillsboro Community Center at 53rd Avenue
- Continue Pavement Management Program road repairs
- Construct a Fire Training facility
- Improve Cedar Street near Brookwood Elementary School

The Council's adoption of the budget follows the unanimous approval of the Hillsboro Budget Committee in May, and months of work and review by Councilors, Budget Committee members, City staff, and community members.

Stay Safe this Summer with 7 Tips

- 1. Allow windows to open only 4 inches, and install window stops or window guards that can be removed by an adult in an emergency.
- 2. While working around your property, keep exterior doors including garage doors that are not in your line of sight locked.
- 3. Stay hydrated on hot days: Keep a reusable water bottle filled with Hillsboro tap water.
- 4. Start and refuel lawnmowers outdoors, not in a garage or shed.
- 5. Children near or in a pool should always be accompanied by an adult. Young or inexperienced swimmers should always wear a life jacket.
- Do not advertise you are away from home by posting your vacation activities or plans on social networking sites like Facebook and Twitter.
- 7. Never leave children or pets alone in enclosed vehicles.

Q & A: What is the Library on the Loose?

The Library on the Loose van brings the library experience to you at schools, City facilities, parks, and local organizations. Sign up for a library card, return a book, play with STEM toys, and take part in a program – right in your neighborhood.

Why did the Hillsboro Public Library create the Library on the Loose?

Library staff believe there should be no barriers to accessing library services and programs. The Library on the Loose van further connects residents to their library by increasing access to materials and supporting lifelong learning.

What kind of books and items can be found in the van?

The van has books for all ages, STEM activities that will inspire and engage, and other materials that will allow for a pop-up program anywhere there's an audience. If the Library on the Loose van does not have your favorite author, no problem. Library staff will help show you how to reserve an item using the van's mobile WiFi.

Where will residents see the Library on the Loose van?

The van will visit local parks, migrant camps in Hillsboro, City-sponsored events, and some Hillsboro School District summer lunch sites. Look for it on the road, or connect with the Hillsboro Public Library on Facebook, Twitter, or Instagram to see if the mobile library is coming to a neighborhood near you. (1)



By the Numbers: HACC Turns 10

The Hillsboro Arts & Culture Council (HACC) is celebrating 10 years of promoting and supporting the growth of arts and culture in Hillsboro as assets for a vital, prosperous, and livable community. Here are key numbers about HACC:

- Established in 2007
- 43 community members have served on the HACC
- Provided 116 community grants, totaling more than \$310,000
- Awarded \$49,057 in grants this year to 12 local organizations
- Provided arts and cultural activities at 24 community festivals
- Served more than **2,300** people at professional development events
- Established a Public Art Program in 2009
- Created the 1st municipal Arts Endowment in the nation

Hillsboro 101: Our Council-Manager Form of Government

For more than 90 years, the City of Hillsboro has utilized the Council-Manager form of government that voters approved through the City of Hillsboro Charter: Hillsboro's constitution. Why is that? Let's find out.

What is the Council-Manager form of government?

Hillsboro's Council-Manager structure is a representative system that places political leadership in the hands of elected City Councilors. The structure also enlists the

expertise and professional experience of an appointed City Manager to effectively deliver the services that the Council prioritizes for the City.

What are the advantages of the Council-Manager form?

Beyond professional expertise,

the Council-Manager system brings accountability. The City Manager serves at the pleasure of the City Council, the elected representatives of the people.


The Council-Manager system often leads to lower costs through improved productivity and service delivery, and the effective use of technology. The local economy benefits from improved business development and retention strategies.

What role does the Council play?

The City Manager makes policy recommendations to the City Council, who decide whether to move forward on those recommendations. The Council also approves the

budget, sets goals for the community, and evaluates the City Manager.

Because political power is concentrated in the entire Council rather than one elected official, residents have more opportunities to serve the community in elected leadership.



As a member of the City Council, the Mayor is a key political leader and policy developer, leading meetings and speaking on behalf of the community. The Mayor also facilitates communications between elected leaders and represents the City in discussions with other cities and governments.

5 Reasons We're Proud to Support HSD Students and Educators

Supporting and showing pride for Hillsboro's high-quality education system is a guiding principle of the Hillsboro City Council. Here are five reasons why the City of Hillsboro is proud to support the Hillsboro School District (HSD):

- 1. **On-time graduation rates rose in 2016** to 81.68 percent, outpacing the state average by 6 percent.
- 2. **Liberty High School senior Bonnie Romeo** was selected to all three of the nation's military academies and will be attending West Point in the fall.

- 3. **More than 1,100 students earned dual credit** (high school and college credit) in the 2015-16 school year, saving \$767,977 in college expenses.
- 4. **Glencoe senior Ashwin Datta** won Best in Fair at Intel's 2017 Beaverton-Hillsboro Science Expo for his invention of a mechanism for rotating microsatellites using angular momentum rather than propulsion systems. Ashwin worked on the project during his summer internship at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), where he will return this fall for his undergraduate studies. Ashwin also is a National Merit Scholar and a winner of the Hillsboro Chamber's Distinguished Youth Award.
