South Hillsboro Selected to Host 2018 Street of Dreams

Rosedale Parks' Vendage at The Reserve to Feature Latest Housing Innovations

All eyes will be focused on the South Hillsboro neighborhood next summer when the largest master-planned community in Oregon history hosts the 2018 NW Natural Street of Dreams®.

The Home Builders Association of Metro Portland selected Pahlisch Homes' development, Vendage at The Reserve, located near Rosedale Elementary School, to host the event highlighting residential construction innovations.

Hillsboro School District 2017 Bond Information

The Hillsboro School District (HSD) Board of Directors has voted to place a \$408 million capital construction bond on the November 2017 ballot. The bond would prioritize safety and security, update and repair aging school buildings, address overcrowding while planning for future growth, and provide a modern education for students.



Maintain Current Tax Rate

This bond would renew the existing tax rate (\$2.24/\$1000 assessed value), and would not increase the current property tax rate.

Prioritize Safety and Security

Making sure school campuses are safe and secure for HSD students, staff and families is a top HSD priority. Unfortunately, some schools lack important modern safety features such as doors that lock from the inside, emergency alert systems, and security cameras.

Solution: The bond would add security cameras, enhance emergency communications, and upgrade security measures that help keep students, staff, and school visitors safe.

"Every Hillsboro resident can take pride in having earned the honor of hosting the 2018 Street of Dreams," said Mayor Steve Callaway. "It's a direct reflection of the quality and livability of our great city."

Vendage at The Reserve is located next to The Reserve Vineyards and Golf Club, and is part of the future 112-acre Rosedale Parks neighborhood within South Hillsboro. Vendage means the harvesting or harvest time of grapes, and the future development will provide an array of executive housing, townhomes, and condominiums to help meet the area's need for a wide mix of housing options.

Road and infrastructure construction in the master-planned South Hillsboro neighborhood continues to progress. Home construction is expected to begin in 2018. Over the next 20 years, the area will boost the available supply of housing by approximately 8,000 homes. South Hillsboro will offer



new retail, restaurants, public parks, open trails, and an extensive multi-modal transportation network for walking, biking, and off-road trails.

"South Hillsboro is 'Where community comes to life,'" Mayor Callaway said. "It's an exciting new destination that will benefit everyone who lives here now, and all of our family, friends, and coworkers who will live there someday."

Hillsboro's Jackson School neighborhood has twice hosted the Street of Dreams: 1981 (NE Geraldine Street) and 2001 (NE Dunbar Court & NE Brennan Lane). The Street of Dreams also serves as a charitable fundraiser for the Home Builders Foundation, which has raised more than \$1.6 million over the last 20 years to build and renovate 21 metro-area homeless shelters in communities including Tigard, Newberg, and Portland.

Every young person in Hillsboro has a story to tell about their personal journey of discovering who they want to be and what career path they will seek: people like Frida Zavala.

Info Kiosks Installed for Wayfinding

Finding your way around Hillsboro is getting easier thanks to new digital information kiosks that were installed recently at the Tom Hughes Civic Center Plaza and at the 3rd Avenue Transit Center. Part of Hillsboro's community-wide wayfinding program, the kiosks feature a map, scrolling event board, public wifi, and solar-powered lighting.

Two more digital kiosks will be installed at Shute Park and Orenco Station Plaza by October, and a static map will help guide visitors in other parts of Downtown and Tanasbourne. You can see what's ahead in the City's wayfinding program at Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/Wayfinding.



Block 67 Project Has 4 Requirements

Market-Rate Housing, Parking, Open Space Among the Essentials

The vacant Block 67 property in Downtown Hillsboro, located across from Tuality Hospital, now includes four mandatory components. Developers interested in the Block 67 project will be required to submit concepts that deliver:

- Mixed-use development with market-rate residential housing
- Open space that serves the larger community and the site
- High-quality urban design and construction
- A plan to address parking at the site



In addition, developers have been asked, but not required, to include:

- Mixed-income or attainable housing
- Employment or job creation
- Retail, food, or a small grocery/market component
- Hotel or lodging options

More than 100 community members attended the second Block 67 open house earlier this summer in which City of Hillsboro staff shared that developers will be required to help address the housing imbalance in Downtown, notably the lack of market-rate units in the Downtown area.

Adding market-rate housing will increase density and activity in Downtown, and increase the purchasing power of area residents to support existing and future local businesses, including the possibility of a new grocery.

Renovate and Repair Aging Schools

Many school buildings are in need of significant repairs with aging and, in some cases, leaking roofs, outdated plumbing and boilers in desperate need of replacement. In addition, the District has 49 temporary portable classrooms, some of which are over 40 years old.

Solution: The bond would repair and update these aging systems, replace 15 of the portable classrooms in the worst condition, and complete significant upgrades at two of the District's oldest schools: Reedville Elementary and Hillsboro High.

Relieve Crowded Classrooms, Plan for Growth

Current estimates are that in the next 10 years, enrollment in the Hillsboro School District will increase by 1,900 students. Some of these students will move into portions of the District that already lack adequate space in existing school buildings, making a difficult overcrowding problem even worse, while others will be moving into new developments in our growing community.

Solution: The bond would construct additional elementary schools where future growth is happening, as well as expand two existing middle and high schools to accommodate expected growth and reduce overcrowding.

WATER NEWS

- The City of Hillsboro Utilities Commission approved an 11 percent water rate increase for all City of Hillsboro water customers, including commercial and industrial customers. The new rate will take effect on October 1.
 - Even with the increase, Hillsboro will continue to have the third-lowest water rate in the Portland metro area. If you are like most residential customers who use nearly 6,000 gallons of water per month, that charge will increase \$3.25, from \$29.50 to \$32.75. - Are you prepared for an emergency? September is National Preparedness Month, and one of the most important things you can do to prepare is to have an emergency supply of water. You can survive for weeks without food, but only a few days without water.




PROGRESS REPORT

Street and Sidewalk Improvements

Construction is underway in the Orenco Station neighborhood to widen **NE Century Boulevard** (formerly NW 231st Avenue) south of NE Cornell Road to two lanes. The project will add a dedicated right-turn lane for northbound vehicles, a pedestrian crossing signal and refuge island, a dedicated bike lane, and a sidewalk on the east side of NE Century Boulevard.

Expect traffic delays during construction hours, including lane closures, between 8:30 am and 4 pm. The project is expected to be complete by the end of October.



- Nearby, the extension of NE Cherry Drive will allow vehicles, bicycles, and pedestrians traveling from NE Orenco Station Parkway to connect with NE Ray Circle. The project is slated to be complete by September 2018.
- Construction is about to wrap for the year on the Cornelius Pass Road/
 TV Highway Intersection Project. The extension of Cornelius Pass Road south from TV Highway to Blanton is expected to be complete in summer 2018.
- Two nearby projects are scheduled to finish at the same time: the extension of Blanton Street from 209th Avenue to 229th Avenue/67th Avenue; and the closing of the 229th Avenue rail crossing at TV Highway. - Wednesday, October 4 is International Walk to School Day. As part

 encouraged to walk or bike to school.







Hillsboro Reads 2017



Q & A with Lisa Colling, HR Director

Lisa Colling sees herself as a helper at heart. Lisa's team in the Human Resources Department works to help the City of Hillsboro's most important resource – the employees who serve our community.

How do you share available job opportunities?

Our employees do a great job of sharing openings through word-of-mouth. We also attend job fairs and post on websites such as governmentjobs.com, Craigslist, and Partners in Diversity. We contact professional organizations, local colleges and universities, and community partners, such as Centro de Prosperidad. The most up-to-date resource is the City's website, Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/Jobs.



Are there jobs available for young people right now?

The City focuses on youth as part of our workforce development program, and we offer paid internships that introduce youth to public service careers. Summer is typically the best time for youth employment opportunities, though you can find positions such as lifeguard or swim instructor throughout the year.

Why does Hillsboro promote the idea of working for your community?

There is an overwhelming sense of pride and purpose that comes with working for the City of Hillsboro. It's an incredible feeling to know your work improves the quality of life of your Hillsboro neighbors each day. While many private-sector companies also offer great employment, the City of Hillsboro offers the unique and fulfilling opportunity for employment that is focused on giving back to the community. There is also the benefit of working close to home, which cuts down on commute time and increases time with family and friends.

7 Back-to-School Safety Reminders

You can help keep students and parents safe as the school year returns by remembering these friendly tips from the Hillsboro Police Department:

- 1. When a school bus is stopped with its **red lights activated**, both directions of traffic need to stop.
- 2. Drivers need to avoid distractions. Leave the phone alone and pay attention for children who may act unpredictably.
- 3. Don't let sun glare cause a crash. Slow down safely or stop if you cannot see.
- State law requires drivers to park at least 20 feet away from intersections. Otherwise, it's more difficult for drivers to spot pedestrians.
- 5. Bicyclists should always **wear a properly-fitted helmet** and use lights and reflective gear in the dark.
- 6. Pedestrians should walk on the sidewalk, if possible. If there is no sidewalk, be sure to walk facing traffic.
- 7. When crossing the street, always look both ways and use a marked crosswalk or cross at an intersection.

PUBLIC SAFETY NOTICE - ROAD CLOSURE DETAILS

2017 Oregon International Air Show • September 22 - 24 • Hillsboro Airport

The 2017 Oregon International Air Show road closure schedule is below. An aerobatic box sterile area – void of people – is required during all hours of the Air Show for the safety of spectators and residents.

ROAD CLOSURES


- 100 percent of Century High School's 2017 AVID
