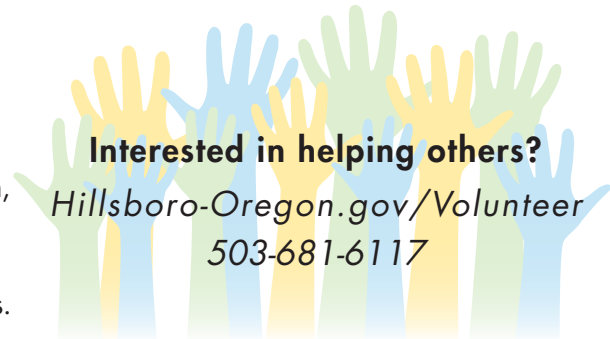

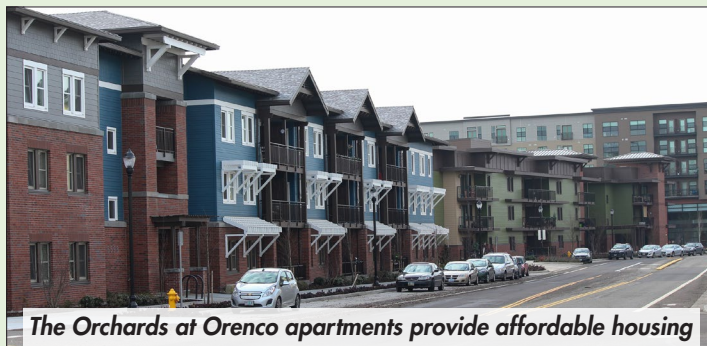

2018 Hillsboro City Council Priorities

- Support community mobility by continuing to improve our transportation system
- Work with community partners to increase public transportation access and service options
- Support cultural inclusion and expanded engagement with diverse community members
- Continue working with community partners to resolve homelessness
- Support the development of entrepreneurs in Hillsboro
- Expand workforce training opportunities that benefit all residents
- Create partnerships to encourage and support the development of more market-rate and affordable housing

- Support the planning and development of the Crescent Park Greenway
- Initiate exploration of receiving a designation from the Tree City USA program
- Continue to plan ahead and position the City 50 years out for future success

- Lead and promote sustainability initiatives, including energy-saving practices and renewable energy
- Emphasize the continued revitalization of Downtown Hillsboro

These priorities are not ranked or ordered by importance, and they are not an exhaustive list of all City priorities. Rather, they align with the City's strategic planning, including the Hillsboro 2035 Community Plan's vision statement, which reads:

"In 2035, Hillsboro is a diverse, sustainable city known for success in blending urban lifestyle, a world-class local economy, agricultural heritage, and a welcoming, family-friendly community for an outstanding quality of life."

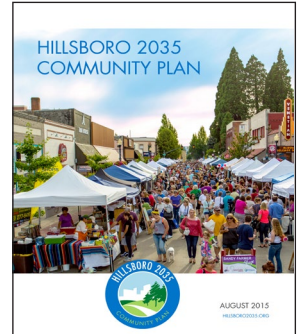


CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Traffic in South Hillsboro: What's the Plan?

About 400 people attended the South Hillsboro open house meeting in February to discuss new roads, housing, and traffic impacts. Below are specific answers to some of the questions asked at the open house about traffic in the area. What has the City done to plan for 20,000 people living in — and driving around — South Hillsboro?

South Hillsboro will offer a welcoming, new place for people to call home. Over nearly two decades, City of Hillsboro planners have considered the traffic that new residents will bring. The City is making changes to streets and intersections to relieve congestion, reduce commute times, and improve safety.

Will we have new roads to accommodate the extra cars?

The expansion of Cornelius Pass Road and Blanton Street, including new signals at three intersections, will provide a north-south alternative to 209th Avenue. Also, the expansion of Blanton Street will create a new east-west option separate from TV Highway, making walking and cycling safer and easier.

What roads will close when the expanded Cornelius Pass Road and Blanton Street open?

67th Avenue (formerly 229th Avenue) will close south of TV Highway and will no longer cross the railroad tracks. A few private-access roads also will close. These changes could happen as early as this summer.

Why does the 67th Avenue/TV Highway intersection need to close?

Creating the new railroad crossing requires that other crossings be closed to meet train storage and operations requirements. The expanded Cornelius Pass Road will handle the increased traffic volume better than 67th Avenue. Drivers won't deal with the bump they face on 67th Avenue south of TV Highway because the Cornelius Pass Road railroad crossing is level.




New development in South Hillsboro

What if traffic gets worse?

As new roads and intersections open and people find their most efficient routes, the City will monitor the changing traffic patterns and adjust as necessary.

What is the City doing to encourage South Hillsboro residents not to drive?

South Hillsboro will include development of world-class bicycle infrastructure to improve safety and encourage commuting by bike. With a 15-mile network of trails and walkable districts, it will be easy for residents to leave their cars at home.

- The second annual **City of Hillsboro Family Fiesta** connected about 150 people with City employees at M&M Marketplace.

- Hillsboro Police Department **volunteer Diane Cadonau** received the Outstanding Volunteer of 2017 award from the National Association for Community Mediation. Diane retired from volunteering with the Hillsboro Police Department last year after 23 years of service.
- Between November and January, Hillsboro’s Fall Leaf Pick-Up and Drop-Off Program collected the equivalent of **468 dump-truck loads of leaves** and 621 pounds of canned food for the Oregon Food Bank. The program helps keep the 230 miles of City of Hillsboro streets clean and reliable, and reduces flooding caused by leaves clogging storm drains.
- The Hillsboro Parks & Recreation Department’s **BLAST program is purchasing 66 Chromebooks** for homework help time. The Chromebooks stem from the generosity of the Richard B. Siegel Foundation, the Hillsboro Schools Foundation, and Sonic. Also, Trader Joe’s donated more than \$770,000 worth of perishable goods in 2017 to the Hillsboro Community Senior Center. 

Remembering Bonnie Kooken

Our community lost one of its champions in February with the unexpected passing of Bonnie Kooken. A resident of Hillsboro’s Old Orenco neighborhood for more than 50 years, Bonnie was a charter member and current chair of the City of Hillsboro’s Historic Landmarks Advisory Committee.

As president of the Orenco Neighborhood Organization and a board member of the Hillsboro Historical Society, she fought tirelessly for the history and character of her neighborhood and the city she loved.



Every Hillsboro resident benefits from Bonnie’s influence and community-building efforts. Driven by her commitment to preserving the land that is home to Orenco Woods Nature Park, Bonnie and her neighbors helped save the historic property for the entire Hillsboro community to enjoy. Anytime we walk through the park, we will experience Bonnie saying hello to us.

Her tenacity helped secure landmark status for the Oregon Heritage Elms that frame the streets of Old Orenco. More recently, she had directed her energy toward ensuring their safe maintenance.

Bonnie’s legacy of dedication and fierce advocacy pales only in comparison to her sweetness, colorful style, and gentle charm. I heard someone refer to Bonnie as the “Queen of Orenco.” I don’t think anyone would dispute that.

We are all richer for her having lived and served in our community.

TUF Approach Keeps Hillsboro Roads Safe

With about 230 miles of paved streets in the City of Hillsboro, helping to keep those roads safe and well maintained is a top priority.

How is road maintenance funded?

In 2008, the Hillsboro City Council created the Transportation Utility Fee (TUF) to address maintenance needs sooner, saving money over the long term. The TUF funds Hillsboro's Pavement Management Program to repair and maintain roads. Because of the TUF, the City is on track to catch up on all backlog maintenance projects by 2024.



What projects did the TUF pay for in 2017?

- Treating, sealing, and repairing more than 25 miles of roadways
- Installing and upgrading 82 sidewalk ADA access ramps at intersections to meet federal standards
- Preliminary engineering on pedestrian-safety improvement projects: SE Cedar Street, SE Golden Road, and NE Jackson School Road

Who pays the TUF?

All residents, businesses, and nonprofits in Hillsboro pay the TUF as part of their monthly utility bill. TUF rates increase each April. The next rate increase — 60 cents per month for residential single family homes — takes effect on April 1. Read more about how the TUF works at Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/TUF.

Street and Sidewalk Safety Updates



NE Griffin Oaks Street

- **NE Griffin Oaks Street** is open to two-way traffic again. The project, funded by the Transportation Utility Fee, replaced the pavement between NE 15th and 25th avenues and improved the existing storm sewer.

- Hillsboro's Transportation System Plan (TSP) will serve as the blueprint for the City's transportation investments over the next 20 years. Get involved in the plan's update at Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/TSP.
- The City of Hillsboro's **Safe Routes to School Program** is helping physical education teachers at Hillsboro School District elementary schools to share traffic and pedestrian safety lessons with students.
- The LED Streetlight Conversion Project kicked off in February. The Light-Emitting Diode (LED) lights are expected to last four times longer than the current high-pressure sodium bulbs and use half the energy. Learn more about the project at Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/StreetLights.

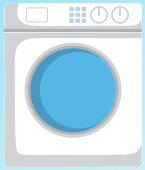

Community Center at 53rd Avenue: Design Work Begins

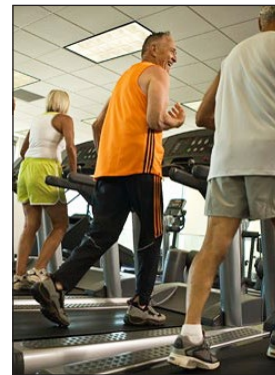
Building a centrally located community center has long been a Hillsboro City Council priority and, in February, the Council reached a significant milestone.

The Council approved a contract with Opsis Architecture to design and engineer the \$35 million Community Center at 53rd Avenue – the largest Parks & Recreation Department project in Hillsboro’s history.

Located on the west side of 53rd Avenue, across the street from 53rd Avenue Community Park, the community center will bring families, friends, and neighbors together in a place that is accessible, inclusive, and affordable. The City of Hillsboro owns the 20 acres of land that will house the facility.

The two-story community center will feature meeting rooms, basketball courts, an indoor walking/jogging track, cardio weight rooms, and other amenities that will enhance Hillsboro residents’ quality of life.

With construction anticipated to begin in 2019, the community center is expected to open in 2021.

Library News Briefs

- Hillsboro Public Library patrons checked out **more than 2.5 million items** – including e-books – in 2017.
- Brookwood Library had the highest circulation of all Washington County Cooperative Library Services (WCCLS) libraries in January 2018, with **180,785 items checked out**.
- The **Library’s Homework Help program** is now offered four nights a week:
 - Shute Park Library: Tuesdays and Thursdays at 5:30 pm
 - Brookwood Library: Mondays and Wednesdays at 5:30 pm



- **2,500 Spanish-language materials** have been added to the Library’s collection.
- The Library’s **Shelf Help service** delivers personalized book picks for readers.



City Lays Groundwork for High-Speed Internet

The internet is an essential utility – like water and electricity. It's a prerequisite for enjoying a higher quality of life. The City of Hillsboro recognizes the importance of ensuring all residents, employers, and schools have affordable, high-speed internet access.



With recent approval from the Hillsboro City Council, the City is planning for the option of providing high-speed internet service in the future. The first step is coordinating with public utilities and housing developers on the installation of fiber network infrastructure (conduit, or pipe), when they plan to build new roads or dig up existing roads.

This "dig once" strategy is cost effective and efficient. It extends the life of Hillsboro streets and sidewalks by preventing the need to dig them up later. Developers pay for the installation of conduit through transportation-system fees.

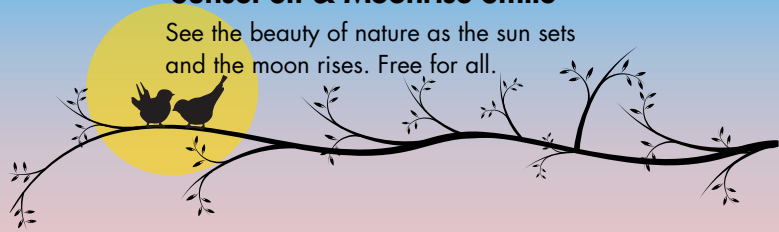
