Killdeer are Protected by Law

- Federal law requires that we protect ground birds and not interfere with their nesting activities. This includes the Killdeer.
- * Killdeer populations declined overall by about 47% between 1966 and 2014, with steeper declines in Canada and the West (North American Breeding Bird Survey).





Killdeer Facts

- Killdeer can help with pest control because they eat lots of insects like beetles, caterpillars, grasshoppers, and fly larvae, as well as spiders, worms, snails, crayfish, and weed seeds.
- * Killdeer nest between early April and late June.
- Egg gestation is 24 to 28 days.





Killdeer are Protected by Law

- If you find a killdeer pair nesting in your garden, let your garden manager know immediately.
- We will work with you to set up a protection zone around the nest until the eggs have hatched and post signs at appropriate locations.
- If the eggs fail to hatch, we will remove the nest.

















If You Have a Nesting Pair

You can continue to garden in your plot around the protected area but take care to do the following:

- Do not ever look directly at the nesting bird, she will get nervous.
- * Move slowly and with patience.
- Make soft whistling sounds to reassure the sitting bird.

Birds get used to people who are regularly present.






If You Have a Nesting Pair

- If it is early in the season, you can choose to move to another open plot for no extra fee and garden there for the season.
- ❖ You may be able to share with someone as well as work around the birds until they finish, then continue in both situations.
- You will receive a bag of Grow fertilizer, a \$15 value!





Discouraging Killdeer Nesting

- Be active in your garden beginning in early March (before nesting season).
- * Keep weeds pulled and remove cover of any sort.
- Put out lots of little spinners and other dangling and clanking objects.
- Some people think that Red-tailed Hawk Scarecrows are good!
