Indoor Conservation Tips

- 1. Replace older toilets with WaterSense labeled high efficiency toilets. Older toilets can use four times more water per flush. Rebates available at: Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/Rebates.
- 2. Regularly check for and repair leaks. Even small leaks can waste hundreds to thousands of gallons of water per month. Many leaks can be fixed by a do-it-yourselfers or a plumber, and repair parts are relatively inexpensive to purchase (\$5-20).
- 3. Install a high efficiency showerhead and you could save about one gallon per minute.
- 4. Install an aerator on your bathroom or kitchen faucet and save about one gallon per minute. An aerator reduces the flow from the faucet, and uses air to maintain good water pressure. These can be picked up at the Civic Center in Utility Billing at 150 East Main Street Hillsboro, OR 97123 on the 1st floor.
- 5. Take shorter showers. Each minute you shave off your shower time saves up to 2.5 gallons.

Outdoor Conservation Tips

- 1. Adjust your sprinklers so that they're watering your lawn and garden, and not the street or sidewalk.
- 2. Water early in the morning (before 10 am) or later in the evening (after 6 pm) when temperatures are cooler and evaporation is minimized.
- 3. Set it, but don't forget it! Whether you have a manual or automatic system, be sure to adjust your watering schedules throughout the summer.
- 4. Established lawns require only one inch of water per week, a bit more during hot, dry weather. Find out how much to water this week with the Weekly Watering Number. Sign up at Regionalh2o.org.
- 5. Consider replacing some grass area with low water use plants and ornamental grasses. They are easier to maintain than grass, look beautiful, and require far less water.



The City of Hillsboro Water Department planned years in advance to ensure there is plentiful drinking water today, tomorrow, and for our community's future generations. While the upper-Tualatin River will continue to be Hillsboro's primary water source, the City of Hillsboro is partnering with the Tualatin Valley Water District and the City of Beaverton to develop the Willamette River at Wilsonville as an additional water supply source.



Leaky Faucet? According to WaterSense, a faucet that leaks at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons per year. Installing an aerator - a small piece of hardware you screw on to the tip of your sink's faucet - can be one of the most cost-effective water conservation measures you can take. Aerators cost about a dollar, and in most cases, take less than a minute to install.





Get Your Backflow Device Tested! Backflow devices serve as the first line of defense against potentially dangerous substances from entering into the drinking water system. Some reasons why you may need a backflow device include irrigation systems, swimming pools, hot tubs, boiler systems, or being on a well. To protect drinking water and safeguard the public water system from pollution and contamination, residential customers are required by law to test their backflow prevention devices once a year by a certified backflow tester to ensure proper operation. 


