The youth lobbied alongside other elected officials in Senator Wyden's office and asked impressive questions about social security and Medicare.

Main Library is Growing

Our Main Library on Brookwood Parkway is a bit young to "be having work done" but the very popular site is already at capacity. When the Main Library opened in 2007, the intent was always to finish the second floor and staff estimated work on the second floor would begin in five to seven years.

Last November, the build out of the second floor began and should be complete by late May. The new addition will expand

the library by 33,000 square feet. This welcome expansion will provide more seating, an additional mile of shelving, three new meeting rooms and eight new study rooms for library and community events. The staircase to the second floor is located where the Reference Librarians used to sit and it will integrate the new second floor space with the existing first floor space.

Eager to share the renovation construction process, library staff kept a running blog with pictures of the construction progress posted to the library's building page: http://growingourlibraries.wordpress.com/

Mike Smith, Library Director, has been amazed at how smoothly the construction has gone. "The noisy, messy work has been done when we are closed. The contractor has worked diligently to minimize dust and interfere as little as possible with the daily operations of the library. This has been a major construction project so that is no small feat."

According to Mayor Jerry Willey, "Libraries are an important part of our community's fabric. Their primary function is to provide our citizens with

eating and exercise and ways to increase self esteem. She wanted to know if the YAC thought the program was worthwhile.

The kids listened attentively to the Nike presentation, asked challenging questions and recommended that the Congresswoman lend her support to the program. The Nike representatives were so impressed with the group's level of understanding, they asked if they could "borrow the kids" for their other presentations that day.

Our young delegation actively participated in conference sessions with topics such as reducing gun violence, immigration reform and building healthy communities. A conference highlight was listening to keynote speakers including Vice President Biden and Senator McCain.

Sections of each day included meeting with other youth delegates from around the nation to discuss ways youth can work together to address important issues in their communities and how youth can help shape and structure communities through their involvement in local government.

I am hopeful that we will continue to see many of these YAC members be active in our future government leadership.

access to information but they are also a place where people attend forums, introduce youngsters to reading readiness or watch a movie which can be family fun or thought provoking. It was always our intent to expand to the second floor of the building and I'm glad we are able to do it sooner rather than later."

The library is planning a Main Library second floor Grand Opening Sunday, June 2, noon to 6:00 pm. for the public. Grand



opening plans so far include musical entertainment, light refreshments, a few speeches and, of course, tours of the new second floor.

The next major library renovation will be at our Shute Park Branch. It will be open through May 11 and then will close for a total remodel which is expected to be complete by March 2014.



City Manager's Report



Planning for the future is an important part of our work at the City of Hillsboro. As a provider of critical

public services such as police, fire, transportation, sewer and water and services that build community such as libraries, parks, and recreation programs, we continually plan ahead so we can meet or exceed community needs and desires.

Your elected City Council actively participates in and provides direction to staff on what we do as a city government. Most recently, the City Council held a retreat in February where they discussed and determined what their top priorities are for 2013.

After evaluating a list of potential priorities that came from City Councilors themselves, prior year Council priorities, the Hillsboro 2020 Vision & Action Plan, various City strategic plans, and current major focus areas for the City, the Council pared the list down to their top ten. In no particular order, the Council's "Top Ten" were:

- Gain Share (a component of the Strategic Investment Program)
- Westside Solutions Transportation Study
- New Community Center
- North Industrial Development Strategy
- Public Works Facility
- 50-year Water Supply Source
- Hillsboro 2020 Vision & Action Plan
- Hillsboro GoPoint Mobility Hub project

- Support the Hillsboro School District
- Transportation funding focusing on bicycle/pedestrian safety and improvements.

These are not the only priorities of the Council and these may change throughout the year. The priorities, however, will guide what we do as an organization for the coming year.

We will be providing the Council with regular updates on these priorities throughout the year. Staff has created work plans for each of them. Redeemable Landfill Coupons

Between April 29 and May 31, the City of Hillsboro, in partnership with Metro, will be issuing \$51.50 coupons redeemable at the Hillsboro Landfill and the Tualatin Valley Waste Recovery Center to offset the cost of disposing of bulky waste items.

A limited supply of coupons is available on a first-come, first-served basis. All fees in excess of \$51.50 are the responsibility of the person taking items to the landfill and must be paid at time of service. Coupons are for Hillsboro residents only and limited to one per household; proof of residency will be required to receive a coupon. Citizens will not be able to pick-up extra coupons for neighbors, other family members or friends.

Coupons can be picked up starting at 8:00 am on April 29 at the fifth floor reception area of the Civic Center, 150 East Main Street. For more information, call 503-681-5204. TV Highway Construction

ODOT, in partnership with the City of Hillsboro, will begin construction this spring on a paving and utility project on TV Highway (OR 8) from Minter Bridge Road to SW 331st Avenue. This stretch

includes 10th Avenue, Baseline Street and Oak Street through downtown Hillsboro.

Drivers on TV Highway will encounter significant construction during the day and night with delays and detours especially in downtown Hillsboro. Though considerable effort is being made to maintain business and resident access and minimize traffic impacts, people should expect unavoidable temporary access closures. Access to the main entrance and emergency room of Tuality Hospital will, however, remain open at all times.

Discover the New Trail Extension

With help from \$1.4 million in federal grants, the Rock Creek Trail was extended about two-thirds of a mile from Orchard Park south to NW Wilkins Street. The construction began in late summer, continued through fall and is officially opening on April 20 for everyone's walking and biking pleasure.

The trail extension is a paved 10' wide surface and is designed for accessibility as well as pedestrian and bicycle safety. The majority of the trail is asphalt with one bridge crossing over the creek and connecting boardwalk. A connection to NW Cherry Lane enables trail users to continue west toward Cornelius Pass Road.

Where the trail ends at NW Wilkins Street, a pedestrian activated signal has been added to facilitate crossing the street to sidewalks or bike lanes on the south side of the street. The ultimate vision is for the trail to extend from US 26 in the north all the way to the Tualatin River in the south part of Hillsboro at Rood Bridge Park.

Hillsboro's Water Tastes Best

Hillsboro's drinking water tastes the best – at least in northwest Oregon. Water from the Joint Water Commission (JWC) Water Treatment Plant (WTP) recently won "Best Drinking Water" for the northwest


Oregon section of the American Water Works
Association. Out of seven entries,
JWC water beat out McMinnville and North
Clackamas for the top spot.

Judging drinking water is a lot like

wine judging. All of the water is kept at the same temperature since temperature can influence a judge's taste preference. The water is also rated based on taste, odor and overall palatability.

"Protecting public health is always our #1 priority," says Jeff Wright, JWC WTP Operator, "But customers also want a pleasant-tasting product. As the largest water treatment plant in Oregon, we strive to do both and it's great affirmation for us to win a best-tasting water title for 2013." Wright accepted the award, an engraved drinking glass, on behalf of the JWC.

Since the WTP can produce up to 75 million gallons of fresh water a day, operators will easily fill a bottle or two for the trip to the regional competition in May and still leave plenty for Hillsboro customers. So feel free to chill a pitcher, fill your glass and judge for yourself the quality of JWC drinking water. Bottoms up!
