

Finance 101: Revenues & Services in Hillsboro

Knowing how local governments pay for community services, projects, and programs is valuable for community awareness and accountability.

Did you know the State of Oregon restricts how many funding sources can be used?

Making it easier for you to be informed about the City's finances, and continuing our commitment to transparency, we're using this space in City Views to explain where City funding comes from — and how it's spent on the services and programs you see daily.

Permanent Property Taxes

Under Measure 50, property taxes on existing properties are limited to 3% annual growth. The City receives some of the property taxes you pay, and these revenues go into the General Fund where they fund public safety services, including Police and Fire & Rescue; facilities and programs provided by Parks & Recreation and the City's two libraries; community planning, and more.

Local Option Levy

In Hillsboro, our Local Option Levy is a fiveyear property tax that provides essential support for a specific use: our Police, Fire & Rescue, and Parks Maintenance programs, services, and staffing. Approved by 82% of Hillsboro voters in May 2022, the rate has remained consistent for the past 17 years.

Utility Bill

Customers pay their utility bill to fund sanitary sewer, surface water management, transportation, and drinking water services provided by the City of Hillsboro and Clean Water Services — and the infrastructure that is necessary. The Transportation Utility Fee funds bike and pedestrian pathways, maintenance of our streets, and more. Also, residents in the South Hillsboro neighborhood are charged a Community Service Fee for park development.

System Development Charges

Development helps pay for itself in Hillsboro through System Development Charges that cover the costs of plan reviews, infrastructure impacts (water pipelines, roads, and sewer lines), and amenities such as community parks and the soon-to-open inclusive park & playground.

Transient Lodging Taxes

When visitors and tourists stay overnight in a hotel in Hillsboro, they pay taxes called Transient Lodging Taxes, or TLT. The State requires 70% of the City's local TLT to be spent on tourism-related activities, such as the Wingspan Events Center, or the future Hillsboro Hops Ballpark.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Hacienda CDC Selected to Develop New Affordable Housing in Hillsboro

More affordable housing is coming to Hillsboro. The Hillsboro City Council selected a proposal from Hacienda CDC called the Dolores for a new affordable housing development in the Tanasbourne neighborhood on NE Walker Road near Magnolia Park.

The proposed 3-story, 67-unit community-inspired building, will be available to residents earning 60% or below the Area Median Income (AMI). In addition, ten units will be reserved for individuals and families exiting homelessness.

The new affordable housing community is inspired by the area's cultural diversity and the site's history as a hazelnut tree orchard. The development is named Dolores in recognition of Latina agricultural labor rights advocate Dolores Huerta.

The City of Hillsboro is investing up to \$10.5 million in Metro Regional Housing Bond funds, pending additional City and Metro approvals required for the project.

Construction is anticipated to begin in fall 2024.

Opening in fall 2023, the Nueva Esperanza apartments at NE 53rd Avenue and NE Hidden Creek Drive will add 150 new units of affordable housing in Hillsboro, with 105 family-sized units with two bedrooms or more.

Community Engagement Shapes New Camping Rules

Along with all cities and counties in Oregon, Hillsboro is updating our camping ordinances to comply with state law and federal court decisions.

Per the new state law and as required by federal courts, communities in Oregon must allow people living unsheltered to sleep and rest on public property — with restrictions when no shelter beds are accessible.

Listening & Engaging Our Community

This spring, the City invited all community members to take a survey and share their experiences to build understanding of the broader community impact of homelessness.

With 894 survey responses in mind, a Camping Ordinance Workgroup of diverse community representatives researched the required updates and prepared recommendations for the ordinance.

The City Council will consider the proposed updates and community input during two meetings in May, with final adoption in June.

\$2.25 Million Awarded to Hillsboro's Year-Round Shelter

Washington County awarded the City of Hillsboro \$2.25 million in Supportive Housing Services funds to create the City's first year-round emergency shelter for single adults.

The future Year-Round Shelter, planned for SW 17th Avenue and TV Highway, will provide shelter and wrap-around support services for adults experiencing homelessness and allow pets.

A hybrid site design will include:

- indoor sleeping spaces
 bathrooms & showers
- outdoor pod village
- dining areas
- laundry facilities
- onsite services

The site currently hosts the Safe Rest Pods, which will continue to provide emergency shelter through June.

NEW PARKING RULES: SHARE YOUR INPUT

Implementing Climate-Friendly & Equitable Communities (CFEC) Reforms

Oregon's Land Conservation and Development Commission has enacted new rules and regulations to reduce emissions and combat climate change.

The new rules require cities with a population of over 50,000 residents to change their approach to parking, which includes Hillsboro.

The new rules will have citywide impacts, and we want to make sure we choose the option that works best for our whole community. That's why we are reaching out and listening to residents and business owners on how best to implement parking reforms citywide.

Hillsboro Hops Ballpark Project Update

The City of Hillsboro is partnering with the Hillsboro Hops to support the team in its continuing efforts to meet new Major League Baseball (MLB) "High A" full season baseball requirements and create a more robust regional entertainment destination for visitors and residents in the Hillsboro area.





Why build a new ballpark and not expand Ron Tonkin Field?

Upon the completion of the preliminary design and analysis, it became clear that the costs would be extremely high to meet the new MLB standards by upgrading the existing facility. Relocating major utilities — and fitting the new requirements into a limited ballpark footprint, while also separating it from the Hillsboro Stadium so it could be an independent facility — contributed greatly to the increased cost.



How will the Hillsboro Hops Ballpark benefit the community?

In addition to allowing the Hops to remain a part of the Hillsboro community, the ballpark will be designed as a year-round entertainment venue and could host more events per year, including festivals, community events, amateur baseball, concerts, and Hops' games.



Where will the Hillsboro Hops Ballpark be located?

The proposed location for the Hillsboro Hops Ballpark is within the Gordon Faber Recreation Complex (GFRC). The ballpark will be in the area currently occupied by fields four, five, and six.



What about the displaced softball fields?

As part of this project, the City is reviewing several options — inside GFRC and offsite — where the lost use will be mitigated and where additional use could be provided. Additional details will be shared in the coming months.



What will happen to Ron Tonkin Field?

The City will gain exclusive use of Ron Tonkin Field, increasing opportunities for recreation programs and community events.

FINANCING EXPLAINED

A majority of the project will be paid for by private financing secured by the Hillsboro Hops. The project costs are estimated to be up to \$120 million.

Under the financial proposal:

- The City of Hillsboro will contribute
 \$18 million in revenues from the
 Transient Lodging Tax (TLT) —
 collected through overnight hotel
 stays in Hillsboro toward the
 project. TLT revenues are required
 to be reinvested in tourism-related
 projects, such as the ballpark project.
- The Hops are responsible for ALL the funding beyond the \$18 million. They have requested \$25 million from the State of Oregon to support the project.
- The City is not considering any tax or fee increases to support the construction of the Hillsboro Hops Ballpark to meet the new MLB facility standards.
- No funding for Police, Fire & Rescue, or other City services will be diverted away from those uses toward this project.

Announcing the Hidden Creek Campus!

The 33-acre area, *pictured right,* is now known as the Hidden Creek Campus.

The campus includes **Hidden Creek Community Center**, **Hidden Creek Park East** (formerly 53rd Avenue Community Park) and **Hidden Creek Park West**, Hillsboro's first inclusive park and playground that will open in August.

Bringing these properties together under one name centers inclusion geographically, philosophically, and programmatically.

"It's a reflection of our efforts to provide equitable and inclusive recreational opportunities for all," said Hillsboro Parks & Recreation Director Dave Miletich. "Accessible facilities, supported employment, and adaptive recreation; these are essential parts of our culture."

Promoting Diversity in Parks Maintenance

Hillsboro Parks & Recreation is changing its hiring practices to create more equitable access to job opportunities.

For many years, language was a barrier to getting promoted in the Maintenance Division at Hillsboro Parks & Recreation. Dedicated seasonal employees spent countless hours caring for City parks and properties, but these employees were passed over for promotions, not because of skill and ability, but because they couldn't check the all-English boxes — literally.

Parks & Recreation leaders are changing that by rethinking job requirements and the hiring process.

Some of the most notable changes include:

- Parks Maintenance Technicians are no longer required to have a pesticide applicators license, a state test offered only in English
- Job applications can now be completed in Spanish and other languages
- Translators can be present at job interviews and staff meetings
- Candidates are scored higher on job performance than on interview responses

These changes made a huge difference to nearly a half dozen Parks Maintenance employees whose first language is Spanish.

"Even though I have experience and could answer the questions in English, English isn't my first language," said Lolo Garcia, Hillsboro Parks & Recreation Maintenance Technician. "It was more challenging to understand and answer the questions."

Creating a more equitable hiring process opens up full-time employment with higher wages and family benefits to the highest

performing, most qualified workers, regardless of the language they speak.

The StoryWalk® program began in Montpelier, Vermont to promote literacy, reading, health, exercise, and movement. Now, it's in Shute Park thanks to grant funding from the State Library of Oregon's *Ready to Read* program.

With support from the Library Foundation of Hillsboro and the Hillsboro Parks & Recreation Department, the Hillsboro Public Library plans to install a new StoryWalk® at a Hillsboro park each year — with stories changing every two months.



- 2. Let children and teens select their reading materials. Kids who choose what they read are likely to be more successful.
- 3. Encourage them to read, but don't make it a chore keep it fun!
- 4. Parents, caregivers, and other adults can help defeat "summer slide" by reading themselves. Children who see adults reading tend to read more by choice.
- 5. Small steps are helpful! Reading even four to six books over the summer can prevent a decline in reading scores.







Pavement Maintenance: Coming Soon to a Street Near You!

This summer, Hillsboro's Pavement Management Program (PMP) has selected eight major roadways for repair.

Four types of repairs are scheduled: crack seals, slurry seals, overlays, and small asphalt or concrete patch repairs.

Keeping up with road maintenance saves money in the long run. Rebuilding a failing road can cost four to five times more than standard preventative maintenance.

City of Hillsboro roadways last about 50% longer because of the time and resources invested to maintain them.

The Pavement Management Program is primarily funded through the Transportation Utility Fee (TUF).

The TUF provides a stable funding source for the City to continue providing this essential service.

Gas taxes, vehicle registration fees, Hillsboro's general fund, and a variety of smaller funding



sources make up the remaining portion of the PMP budget.





Who's Your Water Provider?


Depending on where you are in Hillsboro, your water provider is either the City of Hillsboro Water Department or Tualatin Valley Water District (TVWD).




TVWD serves drinking water to customers located east of Cornelius Pass Road and temporarily in the Butternut Creek neighborhood in South Hillsboro.




Backflow Prevention Helps Maintain Safe, Clean Drinking Water

Residential and commercial property owners served by the Hillsboro Water Department are required to test their backflow prevention device each year.

A backflow preventer monitors the flow of water to ensure it moves only in one direction and keep contaminants from flowing back into the drinking water supply.

Be Lawn & Garden WaterWise

Lawns in Hillsboro typically need only one inch of water a week in the summer months to stay healthy.

Be "WaterWise" with these two tips:

- Install a WaterSense Weather-Based Irrigation Controller on your sprinkler system and apply for up to a \$200 rebate from Hillsboro Water.
- Sign up to receive a free 'Weekly Watering Number' that includes the precise amount of water in inches your landscape needs.

Unidirectional Flushing Update

Hillsboro Water continues to use unidirectional flushing (UDF) to clean the more than 300 miles of underground water mains, one section at a time.

Flushing the underground pipes that deliver water to homes and businesses helps maintain water quality and ensures adequate water flow for fire protection.
