Finance 101: Tax Increment Financing

Why is Hillsboro ranked a Top 50 Best Place to Live in the United States year after year?

The reasons start with the community's goals of having a strong and resilient economy, a variety of housing options, and amenities that provide a high quality of life. Gordon Faber Recreation Complex (GFRC), Ronler Acres Fire Station, and Hondo Dog Park are all examples.


These are also some of the community assets made possible by the City's use of Tax Increment Financing, or TIF, which is also known as Urban Renewal.

TIF is a financing tool that a city can use to generate revenue to thoughtfully invest in infrastructure and projects that might not otherwise be completed.

TIF does not add to your taxes. Instead, it dedicates property tax revenue growth within specific areas to invest back into those areas. We do this to achieve community goals, such as creating economic opportunities, providing diverse housing options, award-winning parks, amenities, roads, infrastructure, and more without raising taxes.

Two areas in Hillsboro use Tax Increment Financing:

In the **Downtown Hillsboro Urban Renewal Area**, TIF has helped increase the vibrancy of the heart of our community through projects such as the 4th Main Apartments, Main Street Commons, investment in the Calle Diez/10th Avenue area, and Storefront and Tenant Improvement Grants. Much of the revitalization Downtown is experiencing today is supported by TIF funding.







TIF funds are invested in needed infrastructure that brings in new businesses that help grow our local economy. The investment in these areas improves Hillsboro's long-term financial health as the property tax base, over time, will help fund future City services for all Hillsboro residents.

Through this economic development, we can help pay for the services you enjoy each day, such as parks, libraries, streets, public safety, and more.

This approach is not new, and it's a big part of the Hillsboro we all know and love today. In the 1980s and 1990s, **the Ronler Acres Urban Renewal Area** helped create good-paying jobs. It also led to the TIF investments that produced Evergreen Parkway, Hondo Dog Park, GFRC & much more.

The Ronler Acres Urban Renewal District no longer exists because it achieved its goals and was closed out. Now, the taxes generated in that area are used for communitywide needs. That will be true someday for the Downtown and North Hillsboro Urban Renewal Areas.




What is the Hillsboro 2035 Community Plan?



Now in Effect: Two Updates to Hillsboro's Public Camping Rules

Vacant City-owned properties where overnight camping may occur are now closed for public use between 7 am and 7 pm to allow the sites to be fully cleaned during the day.

This includes Block 67 in Downtown Hillsboro and the property in Northeast Hillsboro near the City's Public Works building.

The sidewalk access rule has been updated to clarify that the three feet of space that must remain open for travel does not include the curb. This is in accordance with an update to the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Signage will be placed at affected City-owned properties. Communications materials will be updated to reflect the changes.



Community members were invited to provide public comment on the changes from January 15 to January 24. A total of 18 comments were received. Many focused on Camping Rules as a whole, rather than the recent updates.

The City and community partners reopened the Safe Rest Pods on SW 17th Avenue in December.

Our Outdoor Cleanup Project is still underway as we continue to work toward building a Year-Round Shelter at the SW 17th Avenue property near Winco.

OMSI Science Pub Returns to Downtown



The popular OMSI Science Pub series returned to the Westside to give residents a chance to learn about cutting-edge topics in science and technology from leading experts in an interactive, informal atmosphere.

Debuting in 2011, the popular OMSI Science Pub series hosted 67 pub talks in its eight-year run in Downtown, which paused in 2018. It returned in February 2024 as a sold-out event.

Throughout 2024, OMSI Science Pub will be held monthly at Hillsboro's largest food cart plaza — Hillsboro Downtown Station — which features 28 food vendors and an indoor bar with 36 different types of drinks on tap.

The return of the Science Pub is emblematic of the ongoing revitalization efforts in Downtown Hillsboro.

Creating Spaces for Joy: The Westside Queer Resource Center

In June 2023, the Westside Queer Resource Center (WQRC) opened its doors to the public at 233 SE Washington Street in Hillsboro.

The opening was five years in the making, after a group of community members met to discuss the need for more inclusive spaces for queer and trans people in Washington County.



That meeting ended with an idea for what would eventually become the WQRC, a nonprofit aiming to address the lack of access to community services, gaps in resources, and absence of an inclusive gathering space on the westside.

Over the past five years, WQRC volunteers have been advocates for creating welcoming, supportive, and safe environments for the LGBTQIA⁺ community.

The WQRC in Downtown Hillsboro offers events, programming, and open hours from 3 to 7 pm on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. The space offers community members a place to be themselves and access to resources and services.

Looking ahead, the WQRC sees more queer-inclusive programming, education, advocacy, and resources, including civic engagement nights and affinity groups.

These ideas support the vision to create and sustain an environment where everyone belongs and is supported on their journey.





Tackle those Leaks!

Fix-a-Leak Week is March 18 through 24. Now is the time to perform an indoor self-audit to detect and repair leaks and to ensure your home is using water wisely.

Start with the tips below, then go online for direction to find and fix outdoor leaks.

Your toilet may silently leak, or your toilet may sporadically run without flushing.

- Drop a little food coloring in the tank. Wait about 20 minutes without flushing.
- If color appears in the bowl, you have

Consider replacing an old toilet with an EPA WaterSense labeled high-efficiency toilet, then apply for a \$75 water-efficiency rebate from the Hillsboro Water Department: Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/Rebates



Check bathtub spouts and shower heads for dripping water. A new washer may be all that's needed.

You may be able to do this repair yourself by unscrewing the faucet and replacing the washer with one of the same size. Before doing this repair, close your home's main shut-off valve.

You can also consider replacing old showerheads with WaterSense-labeled high-efficiency models to save water.



Check for slower leaks by noting wetness in your kitchen and bathroom sink basins, even those that are rarely used.

To save water, retrofit your faucet with a low-flow aerator. They're inexpensive and easy to install.

Emergency Preparedness: Get Ready. Get Water.

Being prepared with an emergency supply of water is crucial to ensuring your well-being and safety during disasters and inclement weather events, such as the January 2024 winter storm that brought wind, snow, and ice to our community.

Prepare an emergency water supply:

START WITH WATER

Include one gallon of water per person per day in your emergency kit to last you 14 days.







STORE WHAT YOU CAN

Purchase bottled water or use your own sanitized containers to store your emergency water supply.

Help Improve Transportation Safety in Hillsboro

Hillsboro's Transportation Safety Action Plan (TSAP) update is underway!

While we don't have authority to make changes to roadways managed by Washington County or the State of Oregon, we work closely with our partners to improve safety by adding sidewalks and bicycle lanes, adding lighting, adjusting signal timing, improving intersection and driveway design, and reducing speeds.

Here are some of the safety improvements we've made since the last TSAP:

- Redesigned NE Jackson School Road and SE 32nd Avenue
- Upgraded ADA ramps and enhanced pedestrian crossings throughout Hillsboro
- Completed Safe Routes to School (SRTS) projects near elementary schools



Meet Tammy Wallin, Library Director

Tammy Wallin is the new Director of Hillsboro Public Library. Tammy's diverse experience demonstrates a strong foundation in library services, management, and community engagement.

What experiences in your life led you to work in libraries?

I was an early and voracious reader, so while the other kindergarteners were in class learning how to read, I was allowed to escape to the school library,

where the librarian introduced me to Amelia Bedelia and Strega Nona, and biographies of all kinds of famous historical figures.

I was always thrilled by all the potential in the library —
Just look at all the things
I can learn! All by myself!
— and I couldn't wait to go back.

You recently moved to Hillsboro from the Midwest. What about Hillsboro and the Library Director position intrigued you?

As new empty-nesters, my husband and I were looking for a new adventure and decided to look for opportunities in the Pacific Northwest.

When the City posted the Director position, the city name was familiar — one of my husband's cousins lives in Hillsboro — but we didn't know much about it. I was excited to find many of the things we were looking for — a thriving community, big enough but not too big, that was close to the mountains, ocean, and green spaces we wanted to experience.

The library itself was also exciting to me.

Despite being much smaller than the system I was in before, it is forward-thinking and innovative, with lots of interesting programs and service initiatives. I couldn't pass up the opportunity to be part of it.

What goals are you focusing on?

My primary goal in the first few months is to build relationships with as many stakeholders as possible.

I'll also be working on a library strategic planning process as I settle in.

I plan to develop a community-engaged process that results in a strong strategic plan to support and guide the library through the next few years.



2023 Westside Pitch Winners: Where Are They Now?

Westside Pitch is a startup competition for Washington County entrepreneurs seeking to showcase their early-stage businesses.

Competitors have the chance to pitch their business ideas to a panel of local investors, win seed money, and network with venture capitalists.



In 2023, three winners — Fridie Outdoors, Finnegan the Dragon, and UpSight Security — were chosen out of 34 applicants based on their ideas, presentation, and market feasibility.

A lot can happen in a year, especially in the early stages of a new business. Those first years are make or break, but thankfully, with support from the Westside Pitch Competition, last year's winners are still going strong.
