Hillsboro Hops Ballpark Project: Partnership Update

Big changes will be coming to Gorden Faber Recreation Complex (GFRC) in the next few years. Current planning includes the addition of:

- A new ballpark that will double as a regional entertainment destination
- New sports fields
- Additional pedestrian enhancements

The Hillsboro Hops and the City of Hillsboro are excited to expand recreational offerings at GFRC and bring more entertainment options for families to the region.

Project Background & Priorities

The locally owned Hillsboro Hops, an affiliate of the Arizona Diamondbacks, are one of 120 minor league teams who found themselves subject to new Major League Baseball (MLB) facility standards in 2022.


When the City of Hillsboro and the Hops began working together in 2022 to explore options within the GFRC to meet the standards, a series of guiding priorities were set forth to keep the project on track, including:

- Ensuring the project is financially sustainable for the City and the Hops
- Creating a more robust regional entertainment destination that will provide additional benefits to the Hillsboro community, as well as the Hops
- Exploring opportunities to expand recreation across the community

Development & Design

The design-build for the ballpark project is led by Mortenson, along with SRG Partnership and Populous. Mortenson and Populous have designed and built a long list of noteworthy sports and stadium projects, including:

- Climate Pledge Arena: home of the Seattle Kraken (NHL) and Seattle Storm (WNBA)
- Target Field: home of the Minnesota Twins (MLB)





These images are preliminary and the elements of design are subject to change.

Stadium Rendering for Concert

The ballpark will be built in an area of GFRC currently occupied by softball fields 4, 5 & 6. The new ballpark is at 65% in the design process and a final Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) is in the process of being finalized.

Once the City Council reviews the GMP — and approves further design work — the project can continue to move forward.

Project Funding

The new ballpark represents a significant investment in the recreational landscape for the future of Hillsboro and the region.

A majority of the project will be paid for by private financing secured by the Hillsboro Hops, with costs estimated to be up to \$120 million.

Under the financial proposal:

- The Hillsboro Hops will contribute \$82 million in private financing through a combination of borrowing and cash investments.
- The City of Hillsboro will contribute \$18 million in revenues from the Transient Lodging Tax (TLT) — collected through overnight hotel stays in Hillsboro. TLT revenues are required to be reinvested in tourism-related projects, such as the ballpark project.
- The Washington County Board of Commissioners voted unanimously to contribute \$8 million from the County's Transient Lodging Tax.
- The Oregon State Legislature awarded \$15 million to the project
- Explore Tualatin Valley will contribute \$2 million.

New Sports Fields at GFRC

The creation of new sports fields within GFRC is an important project and a top priority.

The City Council, the Parks & Recreation Commission (PRC), and the project team are all working together to make sure GFRC continues to be a destination for sporting events and a hub for community sports and activities.

A variety of field options are currently in the early stages of design. City staff will provide the PRC with a base design, cost estimates, and additional options for the fields at a future PRC work session. That information, along with any staff recommendations, will move on to the City Council for final action. The project team hopes to share a final approved plan with the community by summer 2024.

As the project timeline continues to be refined, the project team wants to maximize availability of fields at GFRC for community use. The Parks & Recreation Department is currently scheduling GFRC fields 4, 5 & 6 for activities through July 1, 2024.

Ron Tonkin Field Renamed

After a decade-long partnership with the Ron Tonkin Family of Dealerships, the Hops' home ballpark will be renamed "Hillsboro Ballpark".

The Hops, the Tonkin family, and the City of Hillsboro entered a 10-year naming rights deal for Ron Tonkin Field in 2014.

For Sahara, Leslie, and Anika, who all recently joined Parks Maintenance in the last two years, the job checks a lot of boxes.





Year-Round Shelter Enters Design Phase with \$850,000 in Federal Funding

The Year-Round Shelter Project is regaining momentum as it moves into the design phase with newly secured federal funding and the selection of design-build contractors.

- The project received \$850,000 in Community Project
 Funding through the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban
 Development. The City continues to explore options to help
 meet total project costs.
- Project partners have selected Walsh Construction & Holst Architecture as the design-build team. The team will collaborate to keep the project within budget as prices for labor and materials fluctuate.
- The Year-Round Shelter Survey closed March 15. Paired with feedback from spring 2022 focus groups, the results will inform shelter design & architecture, operator selection, and elements of a future Good Neighbor Agreement.

Hillsboro Housing Production Strategy

Hillsboro is a diverse community with a variety of housing needs.

The City is conducting a holistic analysis to support housing production by assessing policies, strategies, programs, funding tools, equity, partnerships, and more.

The Housing Production Strategy will be a strategic and flexible tool aimed at increasing production of a variety of housing types, choices, and differing levels of affordability. The final strategy will include specific actions the City plans to take to:

- Encourage the development of the necessary housing types
- Achieve fair and equitable housing outcomes
- Increase housing production
- Advance fair housing, supportive services, and community partnerships

The Housing Production Strategy will help ensure the supply of housing meets the current and future needs of the community.

Washington County and the cities of Hillsboro and Beaverton are working together to better understand the housing and service needs of their residents.

The answers from the survey, and work between partners, will create the 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan — a multi-year housing and community development strategic plan that sets goals and informs how to best utilize federal resources over the five-year period.

System Development Charge Adjustment

The City of Hillsboro Utilities Commission approved an updated System Development Charge (SDC) Study in April.


As growth creates additional demands on our community water system, the Water Department collects SDCs from the purchase of new water meters for new development and additional water demands due to expanding facilities for large water users.

Hillsboro has higher SDCs than many surrounding communities, but also has some of the lowest water rates.

Rates and SDCs are the two funding sources for the water system. Higher SDCs ensure growth pays an equitable share to fund water system expansions, without burdening existing ratepayers.



Finance 101: Clean Water Services

Clean water is essential for life. Have you ever wondered how Hillsboro's waterways stay clean and healthy?

The City of Hillsboro partners with Clean Water Services, or CWS, which provides sanitary sewer and surface water management services to over 600,000 people in our region.

In Hillsboro, the City partners with CWS to provide services, then bills the rates set by the Clean Water Services Board through the City's utility bill. Those services include:



Wastewater Treatment

Collecting and treating wastewater from homes, businesses, and industries, CWS removes pollutants and contaminants from wastewater through advanced processes and then releases the clean water back into the Tualatin River.

Stormwater Management

Managing stormwater runoff helps prevent flooding, protect water quality, and reduce pollution in local waterways. CWS implements green infrastructure projects, such as rain gardens and permeable pavement, to absorb and filter stormwater before it reaches rivers and streams.

Water Reuse

CWS operates four water resource recovery facilities that treat wastewater to a high standard. A portion of the treated water is reused for irrigation on golf courses, parks, school athletic fields, and for wetland plants and ecological restoration. This conserves freshwater resources and reduces the demand on drinking water supplies.

Water Quality Monitoring

CWS monitors the water quality in rivers, streams, and groundwater sources to identify pollution sources, tracks trends in water quality, and ensures compliance with environmental regulations.

Environmental Stewardship

Habitat restoration projects, invasive species management, and watershed protection initiatives are part of CWS' conservation work in the region.

Community Outreach & Education

Educational programs, workshops, and outreach events raise awareness about water conservation, pollution prevention, and environmental sustainability.

Emergency Response

If flooding, spills, or sewer backups occur, CWS provides rapid response and assistance to mitigate community impacts and restore services as quickly as possible.

CWS works closely with the City of Hillsboro's Public Works Department and Water Department to safeguard public health, protect the environment, and ensure clean and reliable water resources are available for our community.

The Transportation Safety Action Plan (TSAP) project team, steering committee, and community members have been working hard on providing insight towards updating the TSAP.

Emphasis areas were identified early on in the process. These emphasis areas are crash trends, with higher risk of frequency of fatal and serious injuries.


As part of our engagement process, the project team has been collecting feedback from community members through Engage Hillsboro, open houses, and in-person tabling events to ask which emphasis areas they were most invested in and why.

The emphasis areas that stand out the most are:

- Distracted Driving
- Pedestrian & Bicycle Crashes
- Aggressive Driving
- Impaired Driving
- Intersection Crashes
- Turning Movement & Rear End Crashes

Site specific and systemic countermeasures addressing these emphasis areas have been developed and we have now entered into the Performance Measure phase where performance measures will be drafted as a way to measure how well the TSAP is being implemented and how effective the TSAP is at reducing crash risk.

Pavement Maintenance Season Set to Begin

The City of Hillsboro Public Works Department Transportation Division coordinates the care and maintenance of our roadways. Each spring a team works together to implement our Pavement Management Program (PMP). This program guides the work done around the City.

It takes time and budget to maintain our roads, but maintenance is important for safety. It reduces wear and tear on vehicles, reduces risk of unexpected dips in the road, and eliminates the need to swerve because of potholes.

Keeping up with road maintenance also saves the City money in the long run. Rebuilding a failing road can cost four to five times more than standard preventative maintenance.

City of Hillsboro roadways last about 50% longer than other cities' roads because of the time and resources invested in maintenance.

PMP is primarily funded through the Transportation Utility Fee (TUF). The TUF provides a stable funding source for Hillsboro and allows the City to continue providing this essential service.

Four types of repairs are scheduled for this summer:

- Crack seals
- Overlays
- Slurry seals
- Small asphalt or concrete patch repairs

Reduced Rates for Garbage & Recycling Services



Eligible households in the City of Hillsboro can benefit from a reduced monthly rate for garbage and recycling collection.

- Customers who pay for their garbage and recycling collection service are eligible if they have an income at or below 185% of the federal poverty level.
- The reduced rate program offers a 75% discount on standard garbage and recycling collection service rates.

Eligibility verification is managed by Community Action.

The City does not provide garbage and recycling collection services. Instead, six private, franchised waste collection companies serve the community with the same rates for services.

City Views readers are familiar with the glossy paper, which was already in use for each issue's insert. In addition to mitigating the ink smell, the previous uncoated paper left photos dark, dull, and difficult for readers to see.

The paper change brings colorful, bright visuals that appeal to a wider audience — helping to connect and inform community members who may not regularly read information from their local government.
