City Council Selects Guiding Principles, 2016 Priorities


What guides the Hillsboro City Council in making important decisions? What issues will be the highest priority in the year ahead? Questions like these helped fuel the recent conversation in which the Hillsboro City Council identified its top guiding principles and priorities for 2016.

With a continued emphasis on advance planning, the list of priorities determined by the Council ranges from broad areas of support to specific actions. Here are some of the principles and priorities highlighted by the City Council:

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

- Support and take pride in a high-quality education system in Hillsboro: preschool through K-12 and higher education.
- Plan for transportation infrastructure that enables mobility throughout the City.
- Continue to plan ahead and "position the City 50 years out" to ensure future success.
- Promote Hillsboro's unique identity; grow and develop with consideration of our agricultural roots.

- Remain a full-opportunity, full-service City for all of our diverse community members in areas including, but not limited to, housing, jobs, arts and recreation, libraries, schools, and transportation.
- Promote transparency and openness in decision-making, including community input.
- Continue the City's tradition of financial stewardship and accountability.
- Maintain community support for our public safety professionals.

LONG-TERM PRIORITIES

- Continue emphasis in City development areas: South Hillsboro Master Planned Community, North Hillsboro Industrial Development, and Downtown Revitalization.
- Implement the Hillsboro 2035 Community Plan.
- Enhance public transportation options and transit services.
- Continue to prioritize street transportation infrastructure.
- Develop workforce training programs.
- Create an arts and culture strategic plan, including public art funding.
- Continue taking a leadership role on community sustainability.

SHORT-TERM PRIORITIES

- Design and construct capital improvement projects, such as a community recreation center and the police headquarters.
- Increase funding for Community Service Grants.
- Increase support for students by expanding the Future Connect program.
- Continue to build sidewalk connections, particularly near schools.

Mayor's Message: State of the City 2016 Address




The City's eight core values help us achieve that mission:

Planning Hillsboro's Future:

Comprehensive Plan Overhaul Begins

Following the creation of the Hillsboro 2035 Community Plan last year, City of Hillsboro planners now are working with community members and partners to take a fresh look at the City's Comprehensive Plan. Using the 2035 Plan as its foundation, the

Comprehensive Plan will dig a little deeper when necessary to fully reflect the community's vision and aspirations.

Throughout 2016, Hillsboro Planning Department staff will ask for your help in shaping the goals and policies that go into the updated Comprehensive Plan. The intent of the Plan is to help Hillsboro grow smartly – while keeping the City the great place it is today – by answering several important questions: What should Hillsboro look like in 25 years? How can we provide housing choices for families, create jobs, build neighborhoods where people can walk to shops and parks, and ensure that our community stays safe in the future?

The Comprehensive Plan is the City's long-term land use and transportation framework, and sets goals and policies to guide growth and development. The last complete update of the Comprehensive Plan was in 1983. Since then, the City has more than tripled in population and doubled in land area.

From natural resources protection to economic development to providing public facilities, Hillsboro Planning Department staff will ask you to weigh in on the elements of the proposed plan update during a series of community summits that will be listed in City Views later this year.

Dollars and Sense: Water, Road Partnership Project Saves Millions

The City of Hillsboro, Tualatin Valley Water District (TVWD), and Washington County are working together to save taxpayers and water ratepayers millions of dollars. In November, the three agencies broke ground on a co-construction project that combines the installation of a 2.8-mile long, 66-inch diameter water pipeline, with the construction of a new section of 124th Avenue that will extend from Tualatin-Sherwood Road to Tonquin Road.

Community members and partners from across Washington County gathered in November to break ground on the 124th Avenue Extension Project.

Together, the City of Hillsboro and TVWD are lead partners in the Willamette Water Supply Program (WWSP) to develop the mid-Willamette River at Wilsonville as an additional water

(WWSP) to develop the mid-Willamette River at Wilsonville as an additional water supply source. By laying the first section of earthquake-resilient water pipeline while Washington County constructs the new road, traffic, construction impacts, and project costs will be greatly reduced.

The historic groundbreaking is the result of years of study, planning, and design carried out by TVWD, the City of Hillsboro and Washington County, and reflects the region's collaborative approach to transportation and water supply planning.

While our existing water supply is currently sufficient, steps need to be taken now to ensure an adequate supply to meet future demands and provide greater reliability. This new water source will begin service to Hillsboro and other parts of Washington County in 2026. For more info, visit **OurReliableWater.org**.





Hillsboro Secures New Spanish-Language Materials

The Hillsboro Public Library has added a new selection of Spanish-language materials written by native authors from Mexico and Latin America. Continuing the Library's efforts to add high-quality, Spanish-language adult and children books to the Hillsboro collection, the newly-purchased materials originate from six different countries, including Mexico, Argentina, Colombia, and Spain.

"We've improved the Spanish-language collections for both adults and children by purchasing titles from large, small, and independent publishers that previously were not available in the United States," said Librarian Elizabeth Lopez, who selected the materials at an international book fair in Guadalajara, Mexico.

Lopez purchased about 500 new additions to the Hillsboro collection, including: juvenile fiction; adult fiction titles published in 2015; STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics)-related nonfiction titles for children;



cookbooks; self-help books; current affairs materials; and, other 2015 award-winning books for all ages.

"Our readers are important to us, and we work hard to have a wide range of titles available for a wide range of interests," said Hillsboro Public Library Director Stephanie Chase. "We are thrilled to be able to work with our colleagues at the Washington County Cooperative Library Service to better serve our readers in Spanish."

Lopez added, "Our STEAM-related nonfiction titles for children, and our juvenile-fiction collection sought after by families with children in dual language immersion programs, will grow significantly."

School Board Supports North Hillsboro Industrial Renewal Plan

The Hillsboro City Council voted unanimously in 2015 to adopt the North Hillsboro Industrial Renewal Plan, which aims to provide adequate and safe public infrastructure, open space, and trail facilities that support economic development by sustaining and growing job opportunities.

Following the Council's decision, Hillsboro School District Board of Directors Chair Wayne Clift offered support from the board, calling the North Hillsboro Industrial Renewal Area "the best, fastest way to spur development and generate additional funding for our district and schools across the state."

In a letter to Mayor Jerry Willey and Hillsboro City Councilors on behalf of the HSD Board, Clift noted that board members are excited about "the potential, over time, for high growth in property tax values that will support the Hillsboro School District and schools across the state, as a result of the development of this land, which currently generates very little revenue."

Clift expressed excitement that the area could generate more employment

and training opportunities for students, while supporting the Hillsboro School District's College and Career Pathways program. Clift also wrote that the addition of jobs in North Hillsboro could produce significantly higher income taxes, which could be used in part to boost school funding throughout the state.

The North Hillsboro Industrial Area represents one of the few significant development opportunities for industrial sites to meet the region's needs – and the public's vision – for job creation and economic growth over the next 25 years.

There's Still Time to Recycle Your Holiday Greenery

Even though it's January, you still may be wondering about the best way to dispose of your holiday tree, wreath, or other greenery. To help community groups and keep the environment in mind, we encourage Hillsboro residents to consider supporting a local nonprofit group that collects trees as a fundraiser. Many Boy Scout troops and other nonprofits set up temporary collection sites around the area: check the Metro website at oregonmetro.gov for a list of locations.



You may also dispose of your holiday greenery at the curb in your yard-debris cart. Greenery collected by your waste hauler is processed and composted, so it is important to remove all wire, frames, ornaments, tinsel, ribbons, lights and other artificial materials. Follow these disposal instructions:

- Cut trees into pieces that are small enough to fit in your yard-debris cart so that the lid will still close. Contact your waste hauler if your tree is too large for the cart, as there likely is an extra charge for disposal.
- Do not stuff the tree into the cart or leave portions sticking above the lid - the lid must close.
- If the tree or other greenery is not prepared in this way your hauler might not pick it up.

Contact your waste hauler with any questions about this service. If you don't have yard debris pick up service, you can take your tree or greenery to a drop-off location such as Tualatin Valley Waste Recovery in Hillsboro, S & Y Landscape Supplies & Recycling in Hillsboro, Northwest Environmental & Recycling in Cornelius, or Nature's Needs in North Plains.



New Shuttle Bus Service Connects Employees and Employers in North Hillsboro



A new shuttle bus service is connecting local employees to the growing number of jobs in North Hillsboro. The North Hillsboro Link shuttle service launched in December, providing free rides every 30 minutes between the Orenco Station MAX stop and employers north of Highway 26.

Led by the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce, a coalition of partners – including TriMet, Washington County, the Oregon Department of Transportation, Ride Connection, and the City of Hillsboro – worked together to improve transit options for employees and employers.

"The North Hillsboro Link fills a significant void and is critically important to the City and region's economy," said Mayor Jerry Willey.

The shuttle bus service will alleviate congestion on local roads, and is part of continued efforts to expand public transit in Hillsboro.

Profile: ASML is the world's largest manufacturer of lithography systems, and supplies products to clients such as Intel, Qorvo, and On Semiconductor. ASML products help

improve tablets, computers, smartphones, and wearables. ASML employs more than 250 people at its Hillsboro location at 7451 NW Evergreen Parkway,





History: ASML was founded in 1984. The company acquired Silicon Valley Group (SVG) in 2001, and maintained SVG's Hillsboro office. In May 2015, ASML more than doubled its space to accommodate rapid growth by moving to its Evergreen Parkway location.

Fun facts: ASML's extreme ultraviolet lithography systems control light beams so accurately it is equivalent to shining a torch from the Earth and hitting a coin placed on the moon. ASML lithography machines can cost as much as \$50 million to \$100 million, and take about two years to build and deliver.



Hillsboro Students Learn How to Save a Life

When someone suffers cardiac arrest, every second counts. The longer a patient goes without Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), the less likely their chance of survival. Unfortunately, the American Heart Association (AHA) reports that 70 percent of Americans feel helpless during emergency situations and hesitate to act.

To improve the odds that bystanders will perform CPR, the AHA updated its guidelines in 2008 to instruct teens and adults to respond to sudden cardiac arrest with just two simple steps: first, call 911; second, push hard and fast on the center of the chest until emergency services arrive. The practice is also known as hands-only CPR, and should not be used on young children.

Since the 2013-14 school year, the Hillsboro Fire Department (HFD) has partnered with 11th and 12th grade students from Liberty High School to teach

this life-saving skill to 8th grade students in the Hillsboro School District. As of June 2015, Oregon State Law requires that students learn CPR training and automated external defibrillator (AED) instruction at some point between grades 7 and 12.



Hillsboro firefighters recently assisted Liberty High School students in teaching students at South Meadows Middle School what happens to the heart during sudden cardiac arrest; why hands-only CPR can make a difference in a patient's survival; how to effectively administer hands-only CPR by practicing chest compressions on CPR manikins; and how to apply and operate an AED.

Hands-only CPR training provides students with the necessary skills and confidence to respond effectively in an emergency. When CPR is provided immediately after cardiac arrest, it can double or triple a victim's chance of survival.

The Hillsboro Fire Department will continue to partner with the Hillsboro School District to deliver CPR and AED training in schools, and HFD employees challenge everyone to learn hands-only CPR. In just minutes, you can learn to save a life.

- The SOS Shelter at Orenco is located at 6701 NE Campus Way, and will operate through February 28. This is an enrolled shelter program at Sonrise Church. Applications are accepted daily between 5:30 and 6:30 pm. Animals are not permitted at this site.
- The Safe Place Shelter is located at 454 SE Washington Street in Downtown Hillsboro.
 The shelter is open on severe weather days for youth ages 13 to 19. Animals are not permitted at this site.

SPLASH Program Helps Middle School Students Develop Leadership Skills



Hillsboro Parks & Recreation Department Supervisor Stacy El Moussi revamped the Team of Recreational Youth (TRY) program a year ago, creating a new program focusing on middle school students called SPLASH, or Students Pursuing Leadership and Serving Hillsboro.

Each fall, interested students apply to be a SPLASH member by submitting

an application and interviewing – then the real fun begins. SPLASH members go behind the scenes throughout Hillsboro to learn about local organizations and facilities, including the Hillsboro Airport (*pictured*).

SPLASH members develop leadership qualities, meet community leaders, and gain skills and experience while volunteering in the community. Students perform service projects, such as planting flowers and pulling weeds in parks, serving lunch at the Senior Center, and assisting at Hillsboro Parks & Recreation events.

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

Rock Creek Trail Project Protects Pedestrians

The project is one of Washington County's five Gain Share Bike & Pedestrian Projects that are funded through the 2014 Gain Share program, and approved by the Washington County Board of Commissioners. The crossing is scheduled to be complete by March.


