# Walking the Talk: How We Support Our Students

Recently, the Hillsboro City Council unanimously agreed to provide scholarship support for the fourth year in a row to 50 high school students from Hillsboro who take part in Portland Community College's (PCC) Future Connect Program. Thanks to our Enterprise Zone, the City of Hillsboro has invested a total of

\$400,000 over the past four years, supporting a total of 200 students with coaching and mentoring at PCC. These students are either the first generation in their family to attend college, or they rely on scholarship support to attend school.

Future Connect is an outstanding example of our young people growing and thriving in a supportive learning environment. As a City, Hillsboro has prioritized supporting students throughout the Hillsboro School District. Last year, our Youth Invasion program brought 300 local high school students to the Civic Center to learn about careers in local government.

The Mayor's Youth Advisory Council (YAC) features 30 of the brightest and most civic-minded young people who have made a commitment to volunteering and being engaged in our community. Hillsboro's summer internship program gives YAC and PCC Future Connect students real-life work experience. Our Interviewniversity program helps students develop resume-writing and interview skills, then apply for real jobs with local employers.







# Technology Helps Us Deliver Great Service to You

One of the best lessons we draw from our community's agricultural roots is the value of conserving money and resources to get the best results. From a farmer's perspective, that means investing wisely in new equipment and taking care of that equipment in order to get the highest yields year after year.

In today's landscape, the City of Hillsboro invests in new technology to maximize our efficiency in serving residents and businesses, making it easier for our employees to provide you with great service and help you accomplish your goals. Like the farmer, and like our modern, hi-tech employers, we are mindful of common-sense opportunities to improve service delivery while saving money over time.

If you look around the City, you will see technology helping us to accomplish our goals of outstanding customer service. We use traffic detection cameras that monitor when a car is waiting at an intersection for a turn signal. By using technology to bring up a yellow flashing arrow, we save drivers time and money, and get you to your destination safely and more efficiently.

Hillsboro Police Department vehicles have wirelesslyconnected laptops that allow officers to work remotely and be in position to serve our community where they are most needed. Our Fire Department engines

are equipped with laptops loaded with building plans and other information that our first responders can access on the way to a scene. Knowing the location of fire exits, stairwells, fire extinguishers, and hazardous materials may help save a life.

In the past, our Water Department employees were asked to visit every home to collect water meter usage information. The process was slow and tedious: pop the lid, check the number, write it down, replace the lid, move to the next house, and then repeat. It was not as efficient as it is now. Today, our Water Department employees can drive down a street and remotely read the meters of an entire neighborhood in a matter of minutes. This radio-reading technology has increased speed and accuracy for better results and cost savings.

Other examples of technology the City of Hillsboro uses to increase efficiency include:

- Digital temperature controls for HVAC systems
- Electronic archiving of documents
- Electronically-submitted development plans
- Energy-efficient lighting

- Data analysis from Geographic Information System (GIS) mapping
- The Book-O-Mat in Downtown Hillsboro
- Sewer scope cameras
- Free public WiFi access in various locations

While we maintain our small-town community values, we recognize the efficiencies created by advancing technologies. In 2016, we expect to be able to reserve a book from the Library online, or to register online for a class at the Walters Cultural Arts Center. Technology is now incorporated into our daily lives, and the City of Hillsboro will continue to seek ways to maximize our efficiency in providing you with great service.



# Rain Art Comes to Downtown Hillsboro

The rainy El Niño season predicted for this year has inspired the creation of hidden artworks on the sidewalks of Main Street in Downtown Hillsboro, which will only be revealed when the rain falls. Like the invisible ink drawings you may have made as a child, this artwork will





require a change in the elements to come to life. The drawings will only last for a few months, so the next time it rains, grab your umbrella and head to Downtown Hillsboro to check them out!

Drawings will be stenciled on the sidewalk in a clear hydrophobic paint that repels water. When showers come, these concealed drawings will appear, turning Main Street into an unexpected art walk. Artist Corey Lunn is inspired by the rain art project to create drawings that cause us to think about water as a precious resource. His drawings are comic and irreverent.



The Hillsboro Public Art Program strengthens our community by creating memorable public places. Public art can take many forms: permanent sculpture, art in parks or temporary installations. Often, art is an unexpected discovery that brings a moment of delight to our day.

# **MORE GREAT NEWS**

- Hillsboro's official population as of 2015 has been updated to 97,480 residents by the Portland State University Population Research Center.
- For the fifth consecutive year, the City of Hillsboro has received the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award, indicating Hillsboro meets nationally-recognized guidelines for an effective budget presentation.
- Jackson Bottom Wetlands Preserve has been selected to benefit from the Orenco Station New Seasons Market's Bag it Forward program. Between now and August 8, 2016, customers can donate their bag refunds totaling five cents for each bag to Jackson Bottom Wetlands Preserve.
- The 2016-2017 Community Arts and Culture Grant
  Program is accepting grant applications online through
  March 25. The program offers financial support for
  organizations providing arts and cultural experiences to
  the greater Hillsboro community.

- The Hillsboro Fire Department joined the Red Cross and 60 volunteers in January to install smoke alarms in the neighborhood between NE 28th Avenue and NE 43rd Avenue, and between East Main Street and NE Laura Street.
- About 300 people attended Mayor Willey's 2016 State of the City Address. Watch a video of the speech online at YouTube.com/CityofHillsboroOR.
- A total of 59 people from 27 countries were sworn in as American citizens in February at the first-ever USCIS naturalization ceremony at the Hillsboro Main Library. The newly sworn-in Americans include 15 people originally from Mexico, 7 from Ukraine, 4 from Canada, and 1 from Egypt, Iran, Iraq, and North Korea.
- The Hillsboro Water Department has written an article to assure customers about the safety of Hillsboro's water supply following Flint, Michigan's discovery of lead in its drinking water supply. To read the article, go to Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/Water.
